

## LIME DEPOSIT ON APPLGATE BIGGEST IN STATE SAYS PARKS

That the lime deposits on the Applegate are of the greatest extent and the finest quality of any found in the state is the statement of Prof. H. M. Parks of the Oregon Agricultural College who visited the Applegate country Sunday, accompanied by Z. Cameron and E. A. Hicks who own extensive marble lands in that section. Professor Parks is at the head of the mineral department of the college, and is devoting much of his time to a study of the mineral deposits of the state.

"There is no question," states Prof. Parks, "but that the lime stone deposits in the Applegate country are the most extensive and of the best quality in the state. Some day that region will have many huge cement plants turning out thousands of carloads yearly."

"I was surprised to note the extent of the deposits. Whole mountains of the lime stone are found in that section."

## PASADENA FIRST CITY WITH COMMISSION FORM

PASADENA, Cal., May 5.—Sharp at 12 o'clock today Mayor Thurm handed over the job of running the city of Pasadena to T. R. Metcalf, and his four fellow commissioners and this city, the first in California to adopt the commission form of government originated in Des Moines, was under the new management. The idea of this new plan is the application to municipal affairs of the practices of every day business. Instead of a city council, meeting once a week, composed of men who devote most of their time and energy to other interests, there is a commission of five men who are paid \$3000 a year each and required to devote all their time to the city's affairs.

NEW YORK, May 5.—The first party of American delegates to the World's Sunday School convention which will be held in Zurich, Switzerland, in July, sailed from New York today for a tour of Egypt and the Holy Land prior to the convention. Several ships have been chartered to convey them to Europe, sailing next month from New York, Boston and Montreal.

## STEWART EDWARD WHITE GOING INTO HEART OF AFRICA



Tired of writing, though it has been his habit to write the kind of books which make money, Stewart Edward White is about to sail on another trip to Africa. Now he is outfitting an expedition at Santa Barbara, Cal. R. J. Cunningham, who has spent most of his life hunting big and little game in Africa, will accompany the author, and the two will have no white companions on their journey, which is to be southwest of Lake Nyanza. They hope to push into other parts of Africa never before visited by white men.

Mr. White has travelled far. He knows lumberjacks, rivermen, hunters, trappers, and cowmen, having lived among them. Most of his books are about them, and breathe the spirit of the open air.

## UNMERGING TIME IS AGAIN EXTENDED

WASHINGTON, May 5.—The United States supreme court adjourned today without deciding any important cases. The court granted the application of the Southern Pacific and Union Pacific railroads to extend the time set for the dissolution of their merger. The court gave the railroads until July 1 to comply with the dissolution order.

## PORTLAND ADOPTS COMMISSION FORM OF GOVERNMENT

PORTLAND, Or., May 5.—The city has emerged from the throes of one political campaign only to be thrust in the midst of another.

When the commission form of government was adopted at Saturday's election it made necessary the election of a mayor and four commissioners. Those who were nominated for office under the old form of government had their efforts nullified by the adoption of the charter amendment.

A number of candidates had their petitions of candidacy ready to be filed Saturday night as soon as the result of the election was definitely known, and others were out bright and early today securing certificates that will entitle them to run. To qualify to run for the elective offices a candidate must secure 100 nominating certificates signed by bona fide voters.

All the candidates for mayor nominated under the direct primary have signified their intention of running for mayor under the commission form. They are A. G. Rushlight, republican, incumbent; H. R. Albee, progressive, and C. L. McKenna, democrat.

Under the commission form there are but six elective offices, a mayor, whose salary is fixed at \$6000; four commissioners at \$5000 and an auditor at not less than \$3600.

### Cock Pit Is Raided.

HALF MOON BAY, Cal., May 5.—Thirty-three members of the red-blooded sporting gentry of San Mateo and San Francisco counties are at liberty on \$10 bail on each today, following a raid on a cockpit near Moss Beach. Under Sheriff Shields and nine assistants confiscated thirty-five game birds, one dead rooster and many pairs of razor edged spurs.

Four lookouts, posted to watch the shouting, perspiring bettors inside the pit, fled without a word of warning. The birds will be served to the prisoners in the county jail this week.

age wage for such employees does not exceed \$5 a week.

### Women Greatest Sufferers.

In the adjustment and payment of wages women are the greatest sufferers. A woman equally competent with a man, who does equally good and efficient service, cannot command the same wages a man receives. What are we to do then to remedy these pressing evils? First stringent laws adequately enforced must be provided to exclude vicious, ignorant and otherwise objectionable immigrants. Second, the livelihood and independence of citizens already here must be protected by securing to them reasonable wages and hours of labor. Third, the national government must regulate both prices and wages of corporations and individuals doing inter-state business. Fourth, these laws must be supplemented by state laws of a like kind regulating prices, wages to be paid and hours of labor."

Senator Works said later in his speech:

### Carnegie Rappe'd.

"Even the charities of the present day have become commercialized."

They are carried on as a business. They are doing more, perhaps, than almost any other influence to make this nation a country of mendicants and beggars. Take a concrete example. One of the millionaires of the day conceived that an easy and convenient way of riding himself of some of his useless and burdensome millions and at the same time exalting himself would be the giving away of public library buildings.

"They are always distinguished by having his name attached to them. These libraries have been constructed in cities and towns without number all over the country. These municipalities have made themselves the objects of charity and more of them are begging for like favors. Any self-respecting community should be ashamed to accept charity of this kind under any circumstances. Much more should they refuse to accept it as coming from such a source."

### No Superior Class.

"There must be no dominating or superior class in this country. The equality of all men must be made a reality and not a theory. This must be made and maintained as a government of the people. If the democratic party can and will accomplish these results, demanded by the people, it may live and maintain itself in power. If it does not, its reign will

be brief. If neither of the old parties can or will restore the government to the people as our forefathers handed it down, then a new party will be raised up that will do the people's will. It will not be a one-man party or one founded on hatred and disappointed ambition, or one dominated or controlled by disappointed trust promoters and political bosses or designing trust magnates seeking three to advance their own interests and ambitions."
