

## SPRAYING OF APPLES FOR MOTH SHOULD BEGIN AT ONCE

Within the next two or three days spraying apples for codling moth should begin. This spray should be arsenate of lead at the rate of four pounds of arsenate of lead to 100 gallons of water. High pressure and a coarse spray should be used. Every effort should be made to fill the calyx cups of the young fruits, as the largest percentage of worms enter the young apples through the calyx cups.

This first calyx spray should be followed by another within 10 to 12 days so as to catch all blossoms which were not far enough advanced when the first spray was being applied. There will be some difference in the time of applying these sprays, depending upon the locality of the orchard. One should judge for himself as to when the calyxes are beginning to close in.

An examination of several hundred cocoons, kept in cages, shows that no codling moth larvae have yet pupated. Last year pupation began as early as March 26, and by April 3 to 15 large numbers of pupae were found. From this it appears that the first brood of codling moth will be somewhat later than last year. The first moths appeared last year on May 10, and the first eggs were found hatching on May 23. This year we do not expect any larvae until nearly the latter part of May. If the spraying is well done, the first brood larvae, which will begin entering the fruit during the latter part of May and first week in June, should be destroyed, and a spray applied a month later should suffice for the season so far as apples are concerned.

Pears need not be sprayed until the latter part of May, beginning about May 25. Of course, pears will not appear until the latter part of May, and since the pear calyxes do not close in, there is no need of spraying too early. If pears are sprayed as directed, a single spray will be found sufficient to control the codling moth.

## ROUTINE BUSINESS OF CITY TRANSACTED

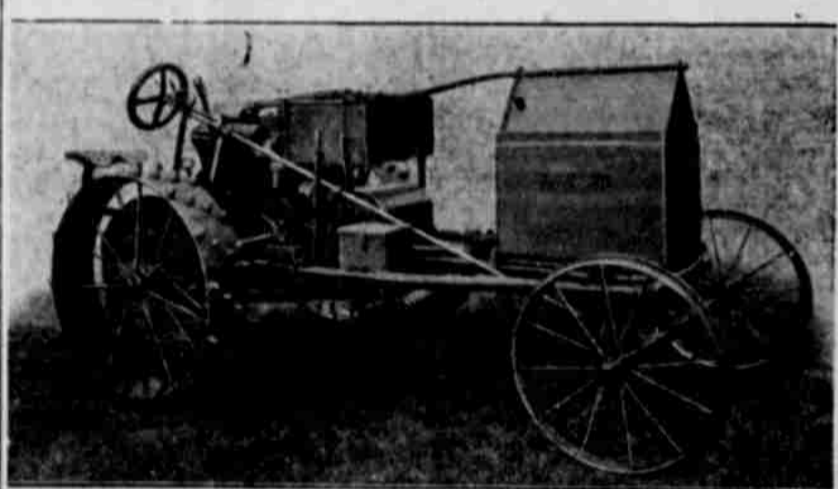
