REBATES GIVEN BY BELL PHONE TO KEEP MONOPOLY

SEATTLE, Wash., May 7.—Testimony that he had received rebates of 15 per cent on all long distance business filed with the Pacific States Company over its lines, and for that reason had quit sending calls over the North Western Company, was given before the state public service commission here today by J. W. Dandow, auditor for the Butler Hotel.

The commission is hearing the charges of the North Western Company's receiver, John B. Coffee, that the Pacific Company has diverted business from the former company.

When Dandow completed his testimony, Coffee announced that as this act was in direct violation of the interstate-commerce law, he would probably demand that another federal grand jury be called to investigate.

In its efforts to put the North Western Long Distance Telephone Company out of business, the Pacific States Company not only interfered with mercantile business, and the activities of professional men but even imposed hardships on Cupid by interfering with long distance telegrams between lovers according to the testimony offered by young women.

Officials of the North Western Company brought a half dozen young women who had worked as telephone operators to tell how calls had been diverted over the Pacific States lines before it had absorbed the Seattle Independent Telephone Company.

CHAMPAIGN, Ill., May 7.—Surrounded by a posse after making an unsuccessful attempt to kill William Goodall and his wife, Howard Randall committed suicide by swallowing carbolic acid here rather than surrender. A signed statement that he had killed eight men in different parts of the country was found on Randall's body.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 7.—Emergency hospital attendants were puzzled today when they catalogued the nature of the accident that cost Willis Hall, 38, two fingers of his left hand.

Hall is employed in the kitchen of a vegetarian restaurant. He affirmed that his fingers were mangled there in a sausage machine.

"It makes no difference if it is a vegetarian joint," he declared to the surgeons. "I've been in the business 10 years and I know a sausage grinder when I see one."

letting Cottage street to Schell & Schell is also a queer piece of business. First they called for bids on one block only on Cottage, the one past my place. I secured a large majority of the frontage protesting against the oil macadam. I thought this would settle the matter but it didn't. R. P. Little, who acts as business getter for the firm, took in an extra block and petitioned for oil macadam again. The total frontage was 2442 feet. The petition when it came in had 1937 feet represented, not a majority, which would have been 1221. We protested with a representation of 997 feet. So they let the contract for oil macadam. This contract has not yet been signed, however, and I intend to stop it if possible.

Spoke to Mitchell.

"I spoke to Councilman Mitchell about the matter and his only reply was that he didn't like the Clark-Henery people anyway." I don't care who he likes or doesn't. I am not pulling for the Clark-Henery people. I want a pavement.

"Let any citizen in town visit Taylor street and investigate. It is possible to take the toe of your shoe and kick out yards of it. With a match I can dig through the entire surface. It is just like black sticky."

"I am told the pavement is cheap. That may be one way of looking at it, but it is dear at any price. In two years whatever it cost will be lost."

Engineer's Opinion.

"I know what I am talking about. Here is what S. J. Van Ornum, consulting engineer of San Francisco, has to say, in regard to oil macadam: "Oil macadam is not a proper paving. \* \* \* I remember one city which used it. After four years the following results were noted: "First year, fairly good. "Second year, surface started to go to pieces. "Third year, worse. "Fourth year, streets repaved with hard surface pavement. \* \* \* Under no consideration could I recommend or favor an oil macadam."

"I intend to fight this matter to a finish. I want paving, not black sticky."

Mr. Welch has the largest frontage on the street in question. The property also faces on Taylor street where oil macadam has been laid. A casual inspection shows that the surface of the street is soft. The oil is mixed with sand and laid on crushed rock. It is easy to remove many square inches of the wearing surface by kicking at it. With an ordinary match one can dig holes through the surface.

PORTLAND, Or., May 7.—The Portland Chamber of Commerce has today recommended the appointment of Joseph N. Teal is conversant with the question, having represented the Associated Chambers of Commerce of the Pacific coast in Washington during the discussion of the Panama canal tolls several months ago.
