SAUCE FOR THE GANDER.

"WITH Medford Trade Is Medford Made," is the slogan of the Medford Merchants association. Yet many of these same merchants send out monthly statements bearing the imprint of Indianapolis, Chicago and Holyoke and other out of the city printers, despite the fact that there are five print shops in Medford who do just as good work, support local payrolls, pay taxes and furnish customers for these merchants.

The merchant may in some specialties save a trifle by getting his printing done outside the city, because both wages and stock are cheaper east than here. But the printers might also save a trifle by buying some of their supplies from the big mail order houses, were they not too patriotic.

The same rule applies to banks and other business houses. None of the big printing firms that make a specialty of bank and other printing supplies, spend a dollar with, or carry a dollars deposit at a local institution, or buy so much as a soda cracker in Medford, yet if the little local plant can't meet the sweat-shop competition, it doesn't get much business—and how can an order for a few thousand be done as cheaply as an order for a million?

All county and city work should go to the local toilers, who help supply the revenues. A public official who sends work out of the locality that pays him his wages, is not very far-sighted or much of a community builder.

The small town newspaper has a struggle to exist and make a product creditable to the town. It has to run a printery to make both ends meet. It has to fight the town's fights. It has to battle for the upbuilding of the community. It has to arouse antagonism by policies for the common good, which sadly deplete its scanty revenues. When there is any kind of a move for the upbuilding of the locality, it has to give liberally of its space, its energy and its money. Its support is essential to the success of any public policy and usually cheerfully forthcoming.

No matter what it is, whether it a campaign for good roads, for lower freight rates, for patronizing home industry, for city improvement, for graft exposure or for any one of a thousand odd things, the newspaper is expected to be and usually is trotting along the tread-mill making the wheels of progress turn.

As a rule, the knowledge of duty well done is all the reward expected or received by the newspaper—that and the enemies its fearlessness creates. But the community must show a spirit of appreciation by co-operating with patronage sufficient to sustain the publication—or it cannot exist. And the death of its newspaper is the worst blow a community can receive.

OPPORTUNITY IN IRRIGATION.

OPPORTUNITY is certainly knocking loudly on the door of the rancher and land owner whose lands are susceptible of irrigation from the proposed high line canal and the land owner who cannot see a good thing in the new contract offered must indeed be ignorant of the blessings of irrigation.

In the irrigated districts of Idaho, Utah, Wyoming, Colorado and California where intense farming is practiced, water rights have grown to enormous values, in many instances reaching so high as \$2000 a miners inch and in the more arid inter-mountain regions it requires no less than an inch to the acre.

The day of intense farming in Rogue river valley is at hand, when land values will be determined not so much by the character of the land as its irrigatable susceptibilities and the amount and character of the water right appurtenant to it.

Branding of Dairy Butter

The statutes regulating the manufacture and sale of butter provide for the branding of creamery butter, but not for the branding of dairy butter except that each roll or square must be plainly marked 16 ounces full weight or 32 ounces full weight. We find some dairy butter that is not so marked and we also find some that is short weight.
