

BRYAN RETURNS TO CAPITOL FROM CALIFORNIA TRIP

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Secretary of State Bryan returned to Washington following his visit to California today, where he went to consult and advise with the Sacramento legislators regarding an anti-alien bill.

Japan's protest to the California land bill has not been completed and it is not believed it will reach the government until the California law is enforced. It is believed here that Ambassador Chinda is deferring action until Governor Johnson signs the bill.

Before the bill is signed President Wilson probably will wire the California executive again detailing at length the national administration's attitude. It is considered certain, however, that the bill will be signed and that the national administration then will act.

Secretary Bryan will confer with the president this afternoon at which time he will make a complete report of his mission to California. John Bennett Moore, counsellor for the state department, already has prepared an analysis of the constitutionality of the California anti-alien law. It is announced that President Wilson has not considered the law enacted by Arizona, Japan not having signified its intention to enter any protest against that measure.

Secretary Bryan plans to go to Baltimore this evening. He will spend the night there and tomorrow will proceed to New York, where he is scheduled to speak Friday night.

PERMITS ISSUED TO USE WATER FROM THE ROGUE

During the quarter ending March 31, 1913, the state engineer issued 17 permits to appropriate the waters of Rogue river and its tributaries.

T. W. Osgood secured a permit to appropriate the water for irrigation of about 9999 acres of land in what is known as the Foot Hills irrigation project, the water to be taken from Emigrant creek. It is Mr. Osgood's intention to supplement the water of Emigrant creek with the natural flow of Keene creek and also water stored in the reservoir on that stream. While Keene creek is indirectly a tributary of Klamath river it is Mr. Osgood's intention to carry the stream across the divide into Emigrant or Rogue river drainage area.

E. F. and T. J. Tyler and E. H. Wise of Kerly have a permit to irrigate 494 acres of land, the water to be taken from Sucker creek in section 24, township 39 south of range 7 west of Willamette meridian.

BIG APPLE CROP FOR HOOD RIVER

HOOD RIVER, Ore., May 8.—County Fruit Inspector John Castner who has inspected 150 orchards this season in the Hood River valley, says the large majority of the orchards have been kept in the very best of shape while a few have been seriously neglected. Mr. Castner states that the greatest lack has been in not spraying for anthracnose. A careful estimate has been made by the inspector relative to the condition of this year's crop and Mr. Castner states that there will be a full crop in most instances and that the number of boxes will exceed those of previous years on account of the fact that a large number of young orchards will come into bearing this season. The estimate is placed around the 1,000,000 box yield.

BOSTON CHILDREN GO ON STRIKE FOR SHORTER HOURS

BOSTON, May 8.—Police and parents appear powerless here today to stop a school children's strike for shorter hours which for concentrated "pep" bids fair to distance the famous "ten party." All over Greater Boston the strike has spread, more than 1000 children being out in Cambridge, Roxbury, South Boston and other suburbs. In all the affected sections great parades of the children are held daily. The police have tried to break up these demonstrations with little success and throughout the city scores of smashed windows testify to the intensity of the schoolboys' feeling and to their skill with rocks.

One hundred "pickets" who prevented other pupils entering a South Boston school were routed today by their parents and the police. Each parent took his child home, there, it is said, to apply personal correction.

FREDERICK WARD AS RICHARD III AT STAR

TO STUDY CURE OF WHITE PLAGUE

WASHINGTON, May 8.—Prominent physicians and surgeons from all over the country to the number of several thousand today attended the opening of the annual convention of the National Association for the Study and Prevention of Tuberculosis, of which Colonel Theodore Roosevelt and Sir William Osler are honorary vice-presidents. The officers of the organization are Homer Folks, president; William H. Baldwin, treasurer; Dr. Robert H. Babcock and Dr. Edward R. Baldwin, vice-president, and Dr. Henry Barton Jacobs of Baltimore, secretary. Thirty-six of the largest cities of the country are represented on the organization's board of directors. The sessions will continue Friday and Saturday.

Under the subject "Treatment of Progressive Cases of Tuberculosis," Dr. Mary E. Lapham, of Highlands, N. C., before the clinical section of the National association, declared that the future treatment of pulmonary tuberculosis in its advanced forms must be surgical rather than medical.
