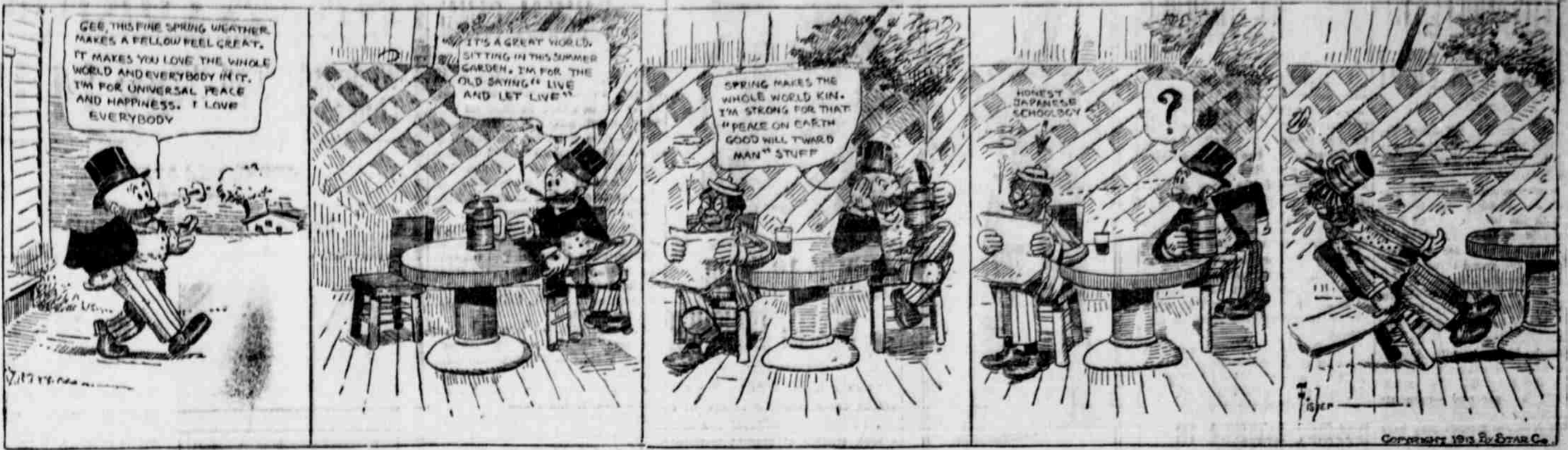


Jeff's from California and Can Prove It
