

HOWARD FOUNDS SCHOOL TO EDUCATE YOUTHFUL CHINESE

Rev. J. K. Howard, formerly of Medford, who still has extensive interests here but is now a resident of Glendale, has gone into the business of educating Chinese youths upon an extensive scale. He is president of the Oregon Chinese Training school, which owns a 10-acre tract near Glendale and is preparing to erect a school to accommodate 200 Chinese students this summer.

Rev. Howard is now in Washington, D. C., where he has secured credentials from the secretary of state and also special credentials from the secretary of commerce and labor to bring in 100 young men from China to the United States.

Morrison Reid of Glendale, a banker, who is vice president of the school, details its plans as follows: "Each of the students will be placed under a \$2000 bond. In the past there has been considerable fraud practiced in the bringing in of Chinese young men as students. They have disappeared and have failed to prosecute their work in the schools and colleges as was anticipated. This is absolutely a new departure, however, as the school at Glendale is not a mercenary enterprise and is not run for profit.

"The school will run 12 months each year and will be devoted not only to the mental but the physical development of the students. We are going to give them manual training and we hope to send back to China a group of young men who will be influential in the adoption of western methods.

"The Chinese in the past have devoted more attention to intellectual matters than to physical development. This is evidenced by the fact that in a recent examination over 200 students passed the mental test to come to the United States while only 30 were qualified from a physical standpoint.

"Mrs. Reid and myself, Fred M. Chu, a freshman in the Willamette university, 19 years old, and William Tom of Seattle, whose parents in China belong to the upper class and who are quite wealthy, leave on May 10 from San Francisco for Shanghai. Mr. Tom is president of the Young China association of Seattle and is a trustee of the Oregon Chinese training school.

"We expect to return to China on August 6. If our American missionaries accomplish a great deal of good, as they doubtless do, in China, we believe that the training of selected young men here in Oregon along intellectual, religious and physical lines will prove equally useful and that they will go back to China better equipped to give the message of the west than those who are converted in China and who know little of western civilization."

ASHLAND CLUB ELECTS OFFICERS

The Ashland Commercial club held its semi-annual meeting recently and elected officers as well as transacted other business, says the Tidings. The officers elected were: W. J. McCoy, president; C. B. Wolf, vice president; W. H. Day, secretary; F. S. Engle, treasurer; R. P. Campbell, trustee for six months; Homer Billings, trustee for 12 months, and F. E. Whitte trustee for 18 months.

The only contest was over the office of secretary, the name of H. O. Frohbach being placed in nomination also. Mr. Day received 14 votes and Mr. Frohbach 10 votes.

D. M. Low was present and addressed the club at some length on the proposition of an exhibit the coming autumn at some of the land shows throughout the country. He stated that the best plan in his opinion was to exhibit at one of the shows in the middle west. He also offered to devote his time free of charge if the club so desired to making arrangements for the raising and preparing of the exhibits, and also to raise a dry land exhibit himself. The club instructed Mr. Low to go ahead with the project, pledging him its support.

KING ALFONSO CONFERS WITH FRENCH MINISTER

PARIS, May 9.—King Alfonso and his premier, Menor Romanones, of Spain, and Foreign Minister of France conferred here at length today regarding the proposed commercial entente between the two countries. The Moroccan questions was particularly intricate. King Alfonso returns to Madrid tonight.

FORBEARANCE NO LONGER A VIRTUE DECLARES WEST

SALEM, Ore., May 9.—Speaking of his proposed libel suit against the Portland Telegram for \$50,000 damages, for publishing defamatory articles, Governor West said: "There comes a time when forbearance ceases to be a virtue," said Governor West, "and I have remained quiet in the face of the Telegram's attacks long enough."

"Every cent of money collected at the state prison has been turned over to the state treasurer and the penitentiary officials have receipts for it. If any money has been paid out of the state treasury unlawfully it is the state treasurer's lookout, not mine. Not a dollar of the state funds has come into my hands."

Asks Investigation. Relative to these attacks Governor West also today addressed a letter to Attorney General Crawford directing him to investigate the charges and bring suits to recover any money that has been unlawfully expended. His letter says:

"There have appeared from time to time in the columns of the press, particularly in the Portland Oregonian and the Telegram, articles in which it was charged that moneys growing out of the earning of the state prison brick yard during the year 1911 had not been paid to the state treasurer as by-law unlawfully expended or not properly accounted for.

Up to Editors to Show. "I take it that the managements of the two papers above mentioned have in their possession such evidence as in their opinion would justify the publication of such charges and that the same will be placed at your disposal upon request.

"If this office can be of any service to you in the matter, please command us."

170 PERCENT INCREASE IN BAND OF SHEEP

A remarkable story of profits in sheep comes from the hills and vales in the Clatsop region, says the Record. Here Matthew Thompson has a small band of sheep with 360 ewes to lamb. Up to Saturday 324 ewes had lambed and he had saved 550 lambs—an increase of practically 170 per cent. One hundred per cent is considered good in larger bands, but Thompson has a small band and is very careful. Still his record is considered remarkable by local sheep men. Thompson used to run 1000 sheep, but cut down on account of short range and according to his present record will make about as much money as on the larger band.

In the Herrin band at the edge of Ashland there are 300 ewes to lamb. About half have lambed and about 100 per cent have been saved. The weather on the hills was bad for lambs when the season started and many were lost, but it is very favorable now. Coyotes have gotten away with a few of the little fellows though hunter and trapper and "the poison squad" have thinned the coyote ranks considerably.

POTATOES SO PLENTIFUL FED TO THE COWS

CHEHALIS, Wash., May 9.—On account of the low prices prevailing here for potatoes, local dairymen are feeding them to their cows. It is said that the increase in the supply of milk is very noticeable. Potatoes were quoted at \$5 a ton today, the lowest price in years.

SCHOOL SUPERVISORS FOR COUNTY NAMED VINEGAR RUN AT CANNERY IS LARGE

The Jackson county board of education met at Jacksonville recently with J. Percy Wells, Dr. Shaw, J. P. Briggs, Mrs. Pendleton and Welborn Beeson present. They elected Mr. Peterson and Mr. Chase as county school supervisors for the ensuing year at a salary of \$120 per month for eleven months, each to pay his own expenses in visiting the schools. The superintendents will travel each approximately 3000 miles in performance of their duties.

Mr. Peterson is a native Oregonian, educated in the common schools of Coos county, and finished in the Oregon Normal school at Monmouth with two years' special training for the position of superintendent.

Mr. Chase has had two years' special training at the Ames Agricultural and two years at the Oregon Agricultural colleges.

The Bagley Canning company has just completed its vinegar run for the season. It has over 24,000 gallons at present in its storage tanks and can turn out vinegar in a short time now. The run was considerably larger than was anticipated and the management feels good over the result.

The addition to the cook room is now practically completed and a force of carpenters is at work on the warehouse. The cannery will be shut down until cherries and berries are ready.

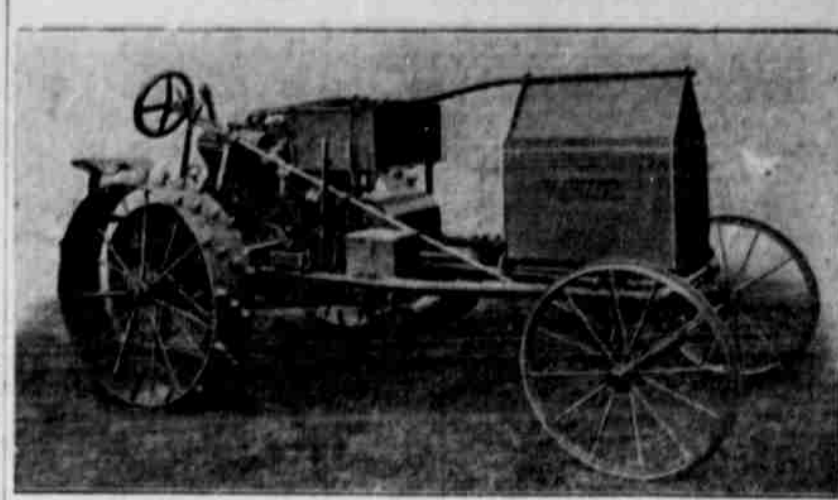
