

1300 ACRES ARE SIGNED UP IN ONE DAY FOR IRRIGATION

RUSHING WORK ON TRAILS KLAMATH RIVER REGION

Fifteen men are now working on the trail from Happy Camp to Sams Bar and one mile of it is now completed. The total length will be 46 miles.

Nine men are employed on the trail and telephone line which are being constructed from Happy Camp to the Elk Creek sulphur spring, a distance of 14 miles. Five miles are completed.

Work is progressing rapidly on the trail from Seiad to the Cook and Green pass in the Siskiyou where it will join a trail from the Oregon side of the mountains. Five miles of the trail are yet to be built.
