GENERAL CLUB NEWS

A great deal of interest was shown in the educational department of the Greater Medford club at its last meeting on May 3rd, as evidenced by the unusually large attendance. The general subject of "Play" in the scope of amusement, free exercise and expression of faculties, was carried over from the previous meeting. Mrs. E. E. Zimmer read a paper in which she spoke convincingly of the moving picture as a phase of modern recreation that

has come to stay. She said that the influence of the movies is in the main wholesome; though the subjects are often trite and generally conventional, they are simple and direct, and at their best are morally appealing and effective. Many of the subjects now being developed are of unusual educational value, and there is every reason to think that the near future will bring this form of amusement to a high degree of usefulness as a factor in the education and pleasure of our youth. A very attractive feature of the program was a series of chart readings embodied in the course of a talk given by Mrs. C. L. Foley on the need, not so much of teaching "Expression" as of allowing children to be and express themselves, and insisting that no other form of expression than the natural and free one is wanted. The repression of children results not only in stilted reading and speaking but in those later forms of social insincerity and dissimulation with which we are all too familiar.

There has been much interest in this department in an attempt to promote enthusiasm over the giving of a pageant play in Medford. Mrs. Helen Gale gave a charming sketch of Medford's possibilities in this direction, and suggested the timeliness of utilizing our store and tradition while as yet these are freshly remembered. A pageant is not difficult to develop or stage. The requirements are that the scenes be picturesque and stirring and show variety and some natural and vivid historic backgrounds. With Medford's history harking back to the pioneer days of Indians and miners, such a pageant would make itself. A play of this kind is not only a unique advertisement of the town that gives it, but brings about a spirit of pride and loyalty, and a greater sense of "belonging" on the part of the citizens. Shall we try it? Let us think about it.

Miss Hazel Rader concluded the program by repeating a Danish folk dance given the previous evening at the Natatorium by a group of high school girls. Miss Rader deserves a great deal of credit for the very attractive and unaffected way in which these dances were given. It is to be hoped she will see her way to presenting more of this work with our home children.

The simple and enthusiastic attendance at this last meeting of the department argues well for the interest in this work for the coming year.

How many know anything about the "Commonwealth Conference" to be held under the auspices of the University of Oregon, May 16-17, at Eugene? This is the fifth annual conference and here are discussed different state problems of the business, civic and social interest of the people of the state. Here are some of the subjects to be discussed: "Steps Necessary to Secure and Maintain the Best Efficiency in the Public Affairs of Oregon," "Organization of Civic and Recreational Activities of Oregon Municipalities," "Municipal Markets in Oregon Towns," "Rural Co-operative Credit Associations," "City Planning," "Readjustment of Educational System to Meet Twentieth Century Needs," "Rural School Problems." Saturday afternoon is to be given over to the women, who will discuss "What the Women Are Doing for the State," "What the Universities Can Do for the Women of the State," "What the Women Can Do for the University."
