CATTLE HIGHER HOGS OVER \$9

PORTLAND, May 12.—Receipts for the week have been Cattle, 1789; calves, 22; hogs, 2432; sheep, 4585; horses, 2.

A higher steer market has marked the week's business in the cattle division. Monday showed a big run and bidding was keen and Idaho and Montana stuff brought \$8.40 to \$8.50 Thursday, with several loads from Stanfield and Echo going at \$8.75 off the cars. The cattle supply throughout the country is limited and a steady market is looked for.

Hogs continue strong, while eastern markets are lower demand is so keen that buyers continue to pay \$9.05 for best light hogs. This firmness may not last long but exists for the week's close.

WHITE IS WORDEN'S RECALL OPPONENT

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 12.—Within the next few days the petitions will be filed to hold a recall election on County Judge W. S. Worden. The required number of signers has been secured and it is now stated that Frank Ira White, formerly a Portland newspaper man and for several years past a local real estate dealer, will be the candidate. Worden has issued a signed statement that he will under no conditions resign and that he will fight the issue to a finish. He invites the recall election and urges his friends to sign the petitions so that the matter may be brought before the voters without delay. He even offers to sign the petition himself and says he will not resort to the courts to gain time.

Worden will make the achievements of his two years in office his main justification for the increase in the county indebtedness. He says he has done only what the people asked him to do when he was elected. He is confident the recall will fall flat. Frank Ira White is now living on his farm a few miles out of the city. He is well and favorably known. He has for the past year given most of his attention to his farm, but is still the head of a real-estate business in this city.
