

DOLL SHOP IS GREAT SUCCESS AS ENTERTAINMENT

They say all things move in cycles. There was a time long ago in ancient Greece when all of the human emotions were portrayed by the dance. There was even a dance expressing grief, used in funeral processions. When art went down in the dark ages the dance went with it, and it is the last of the great arts to be revived and understood.

"The Doll Shop" last night at the Natatorium means more to the community than a mere evening's entertainment. It is helping to create an interest in an art that is of great benefit in the development of our boys and girls. It lends a grace to bodily movement and gives a dignity and beauty to the human form, a mental and physical poise and balance.

About 150 of Medford's young people, ranging from mere babies to young men and women, tripped before a delightful audience in pairs, troupes and battalions last night. There were all kinds of dances, the Irish jig, the Chinese hop, the stately minuet, the graceful swaying Spanish dance, the dreamy waltz—and all were well and gracefully done.

To specialize and say that this one or that one did the best would be injustice, for all did their parts so well that one splendid compliment for the entire company may be taken individually as well as collectively. Suffice it to say the comedians were funny, the singing good and the dancers pretty and graceful.

Mme. Silver is not only an unusually capable instructor, but is herself a splendid dancer. Her work gave a professional finish to the entertainment. She is a lady of attractive personality, and is much beloved by those with whom she has worked and associated while in Medford.

The entertainment will be repeated again tonight. It is being given for the benefit of the St. Mark's Guild. The cause is a worthy one, and the performance is well worth the money. H. H. Howell directed the orchestra and held singers and musicians together in a masterly manner.

TURKEY TROTTER IS FOUND GUILTY

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 15.—George Gates, on trial in the circuit court on a charge of assault with a deadly weapon, was found guilty by a jury. The charge grew out of a fight that followed a dance at Holland on March 22. Gates persisted in dancing the turkey trot, bunny hug and other of the recent dancing creations, and Ed Spence, one of the floor managers, insisted that the tabooed steps be eliminated from the program. To settle the difference of opinion the two young men went out behind the hall, the hour being about 3 a. m., and agreed to fight it out with bare fists. They were surrounded by friends, and while in the darkness a knife was not seen to be used, Spence came out of the affray with a dozen knife wounds in his body, one laying bare the jugular vein, and others penetrating deep into the body. Spence was carried to his home weak with the loss of blood, and for several weeks his life was despaired of.

Sentence has not yet been passed upon Gates.

KELLEY BREAKS UP PERJURY RING IN JOSEPHINE COUNTY

GRANTS PASS, Ore., May 15.—Charles Hogue, charged with perjury, and Everett Hogue, charged with subornation to perjury, were both bound over to the grand jury under heavy bonds in Justice Holman's court today and Bert Lewis and Glen Howard, minors, of Kerby, are being held as witnesses. The charge grew out of a prosecution against Everett Hogue for giving liquor to a minor. During the progress of the trial in the circuit court Monday District Attorney Kelly, in a searching cross-examination, drew from Lewis and Howard the remarkable statement that the four witnesses of the defendant had got together that morning and concocted false testimony in the hope of clearing Hogue. As soon as the jury had retired Judge Calkins in a most scathing arraignment of the witnesses directed the district attorney to bring charges of perjury and subornation of perjury against them.

In the case of the state versus George Gates, which follows the trial of Hogue and which was also a case from Kerby, both the Hagues were sworn as witnesses, but did not testify. Both Hogue and Gates were convicted and will be sentenced Saturday.

Perjury in cases charging violations of the game and liquor laws in Josephine county has for years been a common practice and the action of the circuit judge and the district attorney will have a most salutary effect on the character of the evidence submitted in these cases.

ILLINOIS VALLEY CREAMERY BURNS

The Illinois Valley creamery, located on Althouse about two and one-half miles east of Holland, was burned to the ground, together with the fine McVay residence adjoining, during Tuesday night, both structures being total losses, with practically nothing saved of the contents.

The fire started from the defective flue in a room at the rear of the creamery. The MacVays were in Grants Pass attending court, and a couple was left in charge of the property as caretakers. Tuesday afternoon 100 little chicks hatched in an incubator, and to keep them warm during the night fire was started in a stove in the rear room of the creamery building, and it is from this that the fire started. The chicks were cremated in the conflagration. None of the machinery was saved from the creamery, and a stock of goods that occupied a store in the front of the building was also a total loss.

The flames were communicated to the residence a few feet away from the creamery, and that was totally destroyed, only the piano and a few other articles being saved. There was no insurance on any of the property destroyed.

The Illinois Valley creamery was the oldest of the creameries built in this district, having been in operation at least nine or ten years.
