

STATE ISSUES FIRE WARNING

The state of Oregon desires the heartiest co-operation between the state and all settlers, wood choppers, loggers, campers and hunters. To that end it is urged that the following extracts from the Oregon forest fire laws be given all possible attention in order that all may be familiar with them. Complete copies of forest fire laws may be had free of charge upon application to B. I. Shannon, state supervising warden, Medford, Oregon.

Campers and hunters are especially urged to exercise all possible care to completely put out camp fires before leaving them, as fully sixty per cent of all forest fires result from neglected camp fires.

Burned timber pays no taxes, thus every forest fire is not only a loss to the owner in timber and to the people in wages, but increases the burden of taxation upon all other forms of property.

Section 7. During the period between June 1st, which is hereby designated the closed season, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to set on fire, or cause to be set on fire, any slashing, chopping, woodland or brush land, either his or their own or the property of another, without written or printed permission from a fire warden and compliance with the terms thereof which shall prescribe the conditions upon which the permit is given and which are necessary to be observed in setting such fire and to prevent it from spreading so that life or property of another may be endangered thereby.

This restriction shall not apply to the burning of log piles, stumps or brush heaps, in small quantities, under adequate precautions and personal control, and in accordance with any regulations which may be adopted by the state board of forestry for the purpose of insuring public safety; but if any such burning without permission shall result in the escape of fire and injury to the property of another, this shall be held prima facie evidence that such burning was not safe and was a violation of this section.

Permits to burn, as provided by this section, may be issued by any fire warden, and shall contain such safeguarding restrictions as to time of burning and precaution to be taken as may be fixed by the state forester or left by him to the discretion of fire wardens.

It shall be lawful to build, in a careful manner, camp fires on any uninclosed lands, the owner of which has not forbidden such building of camp fires thereon by personal notice or by posting such prohibition in conspicuous places or otherwise, if, before departing from the place where such camp fire has been built, the builder of such fire totally extinguishes the same.

Section 9. Any person who builds a camp fire upon lands within this state, not his own, without clearing the ground immediately around it free from material which will carry fire, or who leaves thereon a camp fire burning and unattended, or who permits a camp fire to spread thereon, or who uses in any fire arms discharged thereon other than incum-bustible gunwadding, shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty-five dollars (\$25), nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500).

MRS. D'OYLE CART, WHO MADE GILBERT AND SULLIVAN POSSIBLE



Every one of the mothers and fathers, the grandmothers and grandfathers of today, who enjoyed the Gilbert and Sullivan operas in their vague might show his appreciation of them by sending a garland for the grave of Mrs. D'Oyle Cart, who has just died in London. Without her there might have been little of the great musical combination which entertained millions in the old world and the new.

One of those who knew the inside of theatrical matters in London in the days of Gilbert and Sullivan said on her death: "Hers was the genius that kept these men together and smoothed out the difficulties that arose from time to time."

She began as an actress with Charles Wyndham, but her stage career was short. She married D'Oyle Cart, and very soon built his business up far beyond what it was. She superintended the production of the Gilbert and Sullivan operas, and when they crossed to the United States she made trips here to see that they were properly staged. Later she arranged lecture tours for Archibald Forbes, Sir Henry M. Stanley, Matthew Arnold, Oscar Wilde and many others. When she became prosperous she supported many old players, and said little about it. On her husband's death in 1901, he left her the whole business, then appraised at \$1,200,000.
