

RITCHIE SCARED SAYS DONALD

PORTLAND, Ore., May 27.—Dick Donald, manager for "Bud" Anderson, the lightweight championship contender, was emphatic today in his declaration that not only was Joe Rivers afraid of his boy, but Champion Willie Ritchie also shared in this fear. He also declared that Ritchie was an accident.

"Billy Nolan says that Bud hasn't enough of a reputation to meet Ritchie July 4 or Labor Day," said Donald. "Pray tell me where Ritchie ever got a reputation before he met Ad Wolgast. Ritchie was an accident. When Wolgast was knocked out by appendicitis the day before his fight with Freddie Welsh, Tom McCarey was in desperate straits and wired to San Francisco for a good boy to fill in with Welsh. Ritchie, who always keeps in good condition, was available and he went south. Welsh was trained down to 133 pounds, while Ritchie went on at catch weights, which means that he probably weighed 140 pounds when he went into the ring. Welsh got a decision over the bigger man."

"And then he fought that four-round no decision bout with Wolgast and later took the championship from Ad on a foul in the sixteenth round, after flooring Ad with a lucky punch in the fifteenth. And furthermore he has refused to do any fighting since Thanksgiving Day. Why? Simply because Nolan knows there are a number of boys who can beat Ritchie."

Continuing he said: "Nolan can go on talking about the reputation but he knows mighty well that Ritchie doesn't want to take a chance against Bud's hard fists."

FOY AND LITTLE FOYS LIKE VALLEY

The second performance in the new opera house was a big success, both from a financial and a fun making point of view. The play "Over the River" was beautifully staged and had plot enough to hold the interest of the audience. Eddie Foy was very funny in the role of Madison Parke. Foy is not a character comedian. He has not left the impression with us of any particular personality, except himself. Madison Parke is Eddie Foy and Eddie Foy is Madison Parke. He is the same droll, fun maker that made the Henderson extravaganza so popular in Chicago in the early nineties. In fact Foy and Henderson were a happy combination. The Crystal Slipper, Ala Baba, and others of their kind, were beautiful stage pictures, but were lacking in a comedy character. The author failed to draw a distinct character in these plays so Mr. Foy supplied what the playwright had left out and put in the comedy ad libitum. It was much the same with last night's play. Mr. Foy just came on the stage in a good natured way and immediately got on the best of terms with his audience and thoroughly entertained them in his own peculiar style.

The chorus girls were pretty, shapely little ladies who sang well and a pretty feminine chorus is always in the latest style no matter how dramatic fashions change. Special mention should be made of Mr. Davis and Miss Matthews in their several dancing specialties. They were very good indeed and at every appearance won a hearty recall. And, by the way, Mr. William Selery, in his part of Timothy Cook, with his short vest left an impression that will be remembered. Miss Kent sang and acted very nicely. She has a good voice and a pleasing personality.

When a Tribune reporter called on Mr. Foy in his dressing room and asked the comedian if he had something nice to say of Medford and the Rogue river valley, he said: "You bet I have. I want to say a few words about this town and surrounding country and I wish you could believe me when I tell you that it is not con talk but straight from the heart. And, by the way, to see these seven little Foys on the stage in their cute musical turn with their father and then to see them in their dressing room assembled with father and mother and note the love and affection that seem to bind this little band together makes one realize that Eddie Foy is not only a comedian but a man of splendid principals and we were not disappointed to observe the change that Mrs. Foy had made from the premier dancer to the proud and loving mother. We may be assured that if Mr. Foy should settle among us that he will be a worthy and respected citizen.

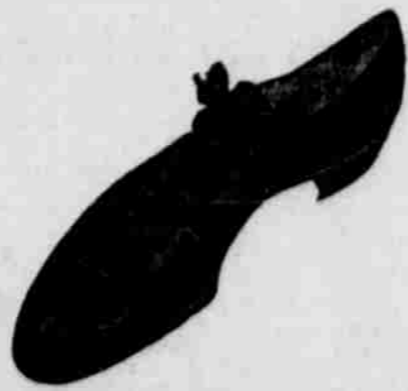
