BIG CLEANUP IN DAWSON GOLD FIELDS

DAWSON, Y. T., May 28.—Dredges and hydraulic plants within fifty miles of Dawson are now running full blast and cleaning up on an average of \$30,000 of gold daily. It is estimated that the total yield this year will exceed \$5,000,000 which was the high mark last year.

Three of the largest gold dredges in the world are being placed on the Boyle concession, two of which are finished and started to work within the last few days.

The first steamers from Dawson with Yukon gold for the Vancouver assay office and the Yukon mint will be leaving here within ten days, just as soon as Lake Labarge is open. The first steamers from Labarge with freight and passengers for Dawson, Fairbanks, Ruby and Iditarod are on their way down the river and are due here today.
