

CHARGE WITNESS IS KEPT AWAY

BOSTON, May 28.—With the hope of bringing the trial to a close this week, Judge Crosby today asked both the prosecution and the defense to expedite matters in the case against William M. Wood, head of the woolen trust; Frederick Atteaux, and Dean Collins, charged with planting dynamite to discredit the Lawrence textile strikers. It is probable a night session will be held tonight.

D. J. Mahoney, an employe at Wood's home in Andover, testified today regarding conferences there between Wood, Atteaux, President Green of the Pacific mills at Lawrence, and agents of the American Woolen company's mills.

District Attorney Pelletier openly charged that Orville Reddick, a chauffeur and a valuable witness for the state, is being kept out of the jurisdiction of the court. Reddick is employed by Wood, but the defense stoutly denied Pelletier's allegation.

Fred Chandler, a justice of the peace of Lawrence, described meetings between Wood, Atteaux and other mill owners.

SCHOONER RIGGING ORDERED OFF HOTEL

No longer will the Medford Hotel be the only schooner rigged hotel in the northwest, for the wireless masts that at present adorn the structure are to be removed. This leaves the U. S. Grant Hotel at San Diego the only schooner rigged hostelry in the world.

Officials of the Federal Wireless Telegraph company are in Medford to dismantle or rather unmast the hotel, as the wireless apparatus is no longer needed, the large plant near Central Point supplanting it. The latter institution has been found ample to fulfill all needs, its superior wire surface rendering the smaller hotel plant unneeded.

THREE YEAR LEASE FOR JAPS MEETS OBJECTION

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 28.—Although the public is eagerly awaiting knowledge of the form of initiative petitions which are being prepared by the Asiatic Exclusion League in order to place a substitute measure for the Webb law before the people, President Olaf A. Tveitmo today declared that it will be several days before a report is had from the experts who are drafting the document.

Tveitmo says that great care is being taken to have the petition absolutely free from technical defects, and also to have it comply with all constitutional requirements.

The opposition of the league to the Webb alien land law is based on the three year leasing clause, which it is claimed would permit the indefinite leasing of land by Japanese.

Edith Cowles Is Bride.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 28.—Miss Edith A. Cowles, daughter of Admiral C. W. Cowles, commander of the Pacific squadron, is the bride today of Lieutenant Leo Salm, chief engineer of United States cruiser South Dakota. They were married last night at the Hotel Del Coronado.

THREE POLITICAL ENEMIES NOW ON SAME PLATFORM



When Theodore Roosevelt, William R. Hearst and Governor William Sulzer stand on the same platform at Carnegie Hall New York, May 28, to speak for direct primaries against Tammany Hall and the state democratic organization the old adage that "politics make strange bedfellows" will have a forcible illustration.

Now Governor Sulzer, independent democrat; Roosevelt, leader of the progressives, and Hearst, creator of the independence league, will war on Murphy and William Barnes, Jr., the republican state leader, who is also blamed by them for the defeat of the direct primary bills.

INCOME TAX LAW SAFE FROM ASSAULTS

WASHINGTON, May 28.—Double riveted, air tight, bomb proof and safe from any assaults! That is the condition of the new income tax law, according to its author, Representative Cordell Hull, of Tennessee. He says the bill is absolutely impregnable against attack in the courts. It has been drawn with such care, Hull declares, that no high-priced corporation lawyer can pick a flaw in it which might imperil its enforcement. Reports that the new law was to be tested in the courts have reached congress. Hull and the members of the house ways and means committee which drew the new law declare that if such attempts are made they will meet with signal failure. They asserted there was little ground for alarm that such legal methods would be resorted to, and the constitutionality of the whole tariff bill was not endangered. They admitted, of course, that if the income tax feature of the Wilson-Underwood bill was declared void by the courts, the whole tariff bill would go by the board and necessitate re-enactment of an entirely new measure by congress.

ROCK ISLAND JOINS WITH SANTA FE IN BIG PROJECT

SAN DIEGO, Cal., May 28.—It was announced here today that the Rock Island and Santa Fe railroads would join hands in the construction of a line from Tucson, Arizona to San Diego. The line is to run from Tucson to Needles, thence down the Colorado river into the Imperial valley, and then to San Diego via San Felipe Pass. It is stated also that the two roads have closed negotiations for the San Diego and South Eastern, the suburban line running from this city.

WESTERN LUMBER BUSINESS GAINS

TACOMA, Wash., May 28.—During the first four months of 1913 the lumber cut and shipments of the various mills of the northwest have exceeded the business of the corresponding period of 1912 by a big margin. Before the members of the West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' association at the monthly meeting here, W. C. Miles, manager of the association, read a report showing that the cut of the ninety mills of the association for the four months of 1913 was 170,000,000 feet in excess of the corresponding period last year, an increase of 24 1/2 per cent.

The shipments from these mills for the first four months of the present year is shown to be 120,000,000 feet in excess of the business for the corresponding period of last year, or a gain of 16 per cent.

WORKMAN FALLS FROM NEW OAKLAND BUILDING

OAKLAND, Cal., May 28.—Jose Chatel, an ironworker, was fatally injured today when he fell from a platform on the new Kahn building and struck on the roof forty feet below. He received a fractured arm and internal injuries.

Chatel was assisting to adjust into position a huge tank when he lost his footing.

SEATTLE, Wash., May 28.—Owners of independent fishing boats are banded together here today for the first time in the history of the industry in the North Pacific to meet the demands of the fishermen's union as a unit. SAYS FROZEN MEATS WILL PROVE COSTLY

SACRAMENTO, Cal., May 28.—That the shrinkage, loss of flavor and decomposition of frozen meats will in the long run make them more expensive than the home product, although originally they are lower by about three cents a pound, is the arraignment of the meats being imported in large quantities from Australia, made today by State Veterinarian Kean. "Housewives who flock to the butchers to buy Australian frozen meats," said Kean, "in the belief that the meat will reduce the cost of living are deluded and they will soon find this to be true. Frozen meat has a big shrinkage when thawed and becomes soft. The juice runs out and this more than offsets the cheaper price. It also becomes tainted very quickly."

LONG BEACH, Cal., May 28.—Memorial services will be held in all Long Beach churches Sunday for the victims of last Saturday's collapse at the municipal auditorium, which carried nearly two score of persons to their death.

The coroner's jury investigating the catastrophe was expected to continue its work today. It is expected that a verdict may be reached before the end of the week.

The county grand jury has completed an exhaustive examination of the death pit, and photographs for future use have been made of the ruins, showing the manner of construction of the portion that collapsed.
