WALTERPAGE WON'T WEAR KNICKERS

LONDON, May 30.—Walter R. Page, the new American ambassador, was presented to King George today at Buckingham palace.

At 11 o'clock a royal carriage appeared at the Coburg hotel, where Page is stopping, and the ambassador, Secretary Laughlin of the United States embassy, and the whole of the staff were driven to the palace.

Page wore ordinary evening clothes. Sir Edward Grey formally introduced the ambassador to King George after Laughlin had presented Page to the Honor Arthur Walsh, controller of the king's household. Later the Earl of Shaftesbury presented Ambassador Page to Queen Mary.

HAVERFORD PULLED OFF CORK HEAD ROCKS

QUEENSTOWN, Ireland, May 30.—The American line steamer Haverford, which went aground early yesterday at Cork Head with more than 300 passengers aboard, was taken off the rocks at high tide today.

The vessel was kept afloat by vigorous use of her pumps and towed into the harbor here.

The crew remained aboard the vessel but the passengers returned to Queenstown and are proceeding to Philadelphia aboard the steamer Baltic. Temporary repairs will be made to the Haverford here, the vessel then proceeding to Liverpool.

FRISCO AFTER GREAT DRYDOCK

WASHINGTON, May 30.—California congressmen are planning today a big fight at the next session of congress to secure for San Francisco construction of a great naval drydock, following the anticipated abandonment of the great works at Pearl Harbor, Hawaii.

The California project follows the filing with Secretary of the Navy Daniels of a report on the Pearl Harbor dock by Rear Admiral Sanford. He declares that the bottom of Pearl Harbor will not properly sustain the weight of the great dock and advocates that any attempt to rebuild it be abandoned.
