The jury cited the death in the accident of Mrs. Martha J. Barnetts, and assigned the same cause of the deaths of thirty-five others.

COMMISSION MEN TO CONTEST NEW LAW

The law introduced at the last session of the legislature regulating and licensing commission merchants will be contested in the courts of the state according to advices received Friday by Representative Carlin, father of the bill, from State Attorney General A. M. Crawford. The constitutionality of the act will be contested by the action filed. According to Representative Carlin the act was copied from the Minnesota act having the regulation of commission merchants in mind, and the suit to test its legality is the last stand of the commission merchants of the state to forestall a measure intended to benefit the ultimate consumer.

NEW YORK, May 30.—Bitter denunciation of the wives of rich men who seek divorce to get fortunes in alimony is voiced here today by Justice Aspinwall of the state supreme court. The outburst came during the case of Mrs. Blanche A. W. Heye, who seeks an absolute divorce and \$5000 a month alimony from George C. Heye.

"A woman don't need that much to live comfortably," snapped Justice Aspinwall. "Lots of women haven't any station until they marry rich men. They get all the coin they can and when their husbands tighten up they ask divorce and fortunes in alimony." "You New York society women make me sick. You go to hotels and clubs and drink highballs and cocktails and smoke cigarettes when you should be at home nursing a baby. You bring suit against a poor man unfortunate enough to own a million, and then talk about maintaining social positions. Bosh!"
