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Dr. Bertha Stuart, physical director of women at the University of Oregon, with Miss Thomson, director of field sports, spent Wednesday and Thursday of this week in the city, as guests of the Greater Medford club. They were brought here by the home economics department, to whom they gave a most helpful talk on "Food and Dietetics" Wednesday afternoon. At the request of the social hygiene department this was followed by a talk on some of the most practical phases of social hygiene. This was a very satisfactory discussion of an extremely difficult subject and was filled with very practical suggestions for those needing help along these lines. A reception was held at the close of the meeting in order that those present might meet the guests. Fruit punch and waters were served.

Dr. Stuart was instrumental in starting the public playground movement in Eugene. Knowing this, the educational department of the Greater Medford club, which is very keenly interested in this subject, persuaded her to remain Thursday, when she talked to a very good sized audience on the mezzanine floor of the Medford hotel. At the close her talk which was received with much enthusiasm, Dr. Stuart, together with Mayor Elbert and a committee from the club, drove about town to select the most desirable location, of those available, for the location of the playgrounds.

Dr. Stuart, in her position as physical director, sees the urgent need of systematic exercise among the young women. To that end she has outlined a most fascinating scheme for physical exercise among the high school girls. Her plan is for a statewide organization which shall ultimately include every school in the state. The exercises include walking, mountain climbing, horseback riding, tennis, basketball, baseball, swimming, arching, golf, canoeing, trout fishing and out of door games of all sorts. Points are also given for hygienic living, such as outdoor sleeping, wearing of low heels, refraining from eating between meals, setting nine hours of sleep each night, and so on. She met with some 25 or 30 of the high school girls on both Wednesday and Thursday mornings and found them most enthusiastic. Committees were appointed and steps were taken looking toward permanent organization in the fall.

In the absence of the chairman, Mrs. Rebeck, of the educational department, Mrs. Gore reported that the department had taken up the subject of a public playground and had also discussed the subject of simpler dressing. Miss M. Kaiser of Ashland had visited the department and handled the subject of dress with much enthusiasm.

The social hygiene report was read by Mrs. Fred N. Cummings. The department has held but one meeting, owing to the illness of the chairman, Mrs. Stearns. A splendid program and course of study have been mapped out for next year with neighborhood study clubs included. Mrs. Bert Harmon gave the treasurer's report as follows:
