Californian Persistent.

One of the most persistent members of the "insidious lobby" is G. Harold Powell, representing the California fruit growers association, if Senator Pletcher is to be believed He testified today that Powell kept after him hot and hard in the interests of California fruit men.

Fletcher declared:

"The day of the old-style lobbyist who infested the corridors of legislative chambers is past. Nowadays senators will listen only to principals and the passage of monthly bills, in business matters. Defends the Lobby.

Fletcher warmly defended the "legitimate lobbyist." He declared there undoubtedly is a powerful "scientific lobby" in Washington, but asserted that it is not composed of paid agents, but is a gathering of the heads of big business interests who personally impress their views on congressmen and senators as was set forth in the Penrose testimony. He presented the names of 175 big business men who had protested against the proposed tariff revision to him and to other senators.

> No Charge to Be Made. If an elector completes his residence, or reaches the age of 21 years during the period in which the registers are closed, he may be registered any time within four months next preceding the losing of the registration,

tered. Every person that is registered but fails to vote at the next or any of the following general elections will have to register again before being allowed to vote. If an elector desires to change his political affiliation he may register again, and must reregister when he moves from one precinct and gain residence ir another, n each instance he shall surrender his certificate of registration which shall be cancelled.
