WOMEN'S CONGRESS MEETS AT PARIS

PARIS, June 4.—American women took a prominent part in today's sessions of the great International Women's congress which has been in convention here two days and will continue through Saturday. Important speeches made today were on the great good which has come in the way of legislation in those of the United States which have granted the franchise to women, on child hygiene and on the part women should play in sociological work. One of the features of today's session was the promised announcement that the National Council of Frenchwomen, under whose auspices the congress is being held, has resolved to begin immediately a strenuous campaign for votes for women throughout France. The announcement was enthusiastically received. It was tentatively planned that prominent English and American speakers will be engaged to aid in the promised campaign for votes for women of France. The congress is the tenth annual one held by the international group of women's organizations.

BRIDES AND GROOMS MUST BE EXAMINED

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4. The new law requiring physicians' certificates of men applying for marriage licenses became effective today. All records for the issuing of licenses in Multnomah county were broken when 137 were secured on the two days preceding today by men anxious to evade the provisions of this law. The new statute provides drastic punishment for physicians who issue false certificates, to prospective bridegrooms including the cancellation of licenses to practice and jail sentences.

FINES FOR WOMEN WITH BIG HAT PINS

SEATTLE, Wash., June 4.—When the fourth of July 1913 comes round, Seattle will also celebrate its new hatpin ordinance, which will be made effective that day. The bill, providing jail and fine for women who allow hatpins to project more than an inch and a quarter beyond the crown of the hat was passed by the council unanimously. It was initiated by the Federation of Women's clubs and fathered by President of the Council Hesketh. The maximum imprisonment is thirty days.
