COUNCIL PASSES WEED ORDINANCE

by the city council at the regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening. The Fourth of July celebration committee was empowered to act as it saw fit for the occasion. Several ordinances were passed, licenses granted and the monthly bills allowed. Paul Krutzer of Riverside avenue dramatically protested the action of the water superintendent in cutting off his water because he would not install a meter for the two acres he was irrigating, but the council refused to interfere. Paving of several alleys was ordered.

The measure requiring the removal of weeds, etc., passed without a dissenting vote. It concerns all property within the city limits, except where grass is grown for crops or grazing purposes. It will mean less danger from fire this summer and a more beautiful city.

City Handed to July 4th Committee By unanimous adoption of a reso lution the streets and alleys, vacant places and public spaces were officfally handed over to the Fourth of July committee on that day to be used as the said committee may see fit, providing that the interests of the merchants and ordinances of the city are not interfered with.

Drinking Fountains

The question of allowing free drinking fountains in business houses was taken up, but the matter was referred to a committee. A compressed air tank, that is necessary before the siren whistle on the fire hall can be used, will probably be provided for at the next meeting.

An ordinance requiring that a license of \$30 be paid before an automobile owner can use his car inside the city limits of Medford for hire and establishing a maximum rate was referred to the license committee.

New Sewers and Sidewalks An ordinance requiring a sewer system between Second and Ninth streets, on Oak street was unanimously passed at the city council meeting last night, as well as one for a sidewalk on East Main. Sidewalks one one side of Dakota avenue, where several property owners have neglected to construct them, were also required by a unanimous motion.

WORDEN DEFEATS WHITE IN KLAMATH RECALL

KLAMATH FALLS, June 4.-With a majority of nearly three to one, Will S. Worden defeated Frank Ira White in the recall election for County Judge. The total vote, not counting some small outlying precincts. which will make Worden's lead still further, gives Worden 2,065 to White's 803. This leaves Worden a majority of 1,262.

It also shows that the vote all over the county was by far the largest ever east in any sort of an election, the total reaching nearly 3,000 when the final figures are all in and counted. This vote was largely added to by the women who have been given suffrage, this being their first general vote. The figures last night show a vote of 2,868.

Bryan's term as secretary of state.
