

## ARMY USED TO QUELL BLOODY RIOT IN PARLIAMENT

BUDAPEST, June 5.—Cavalry, infantry and machine guns are guarding the approaches to parliament here today to prevent, if possible, further disturbances such as yesterday resulted in a bloody riot in the chamber of deputies, as a prelude to the resignation of the premier, Dr. Von Lukacs, and his cabinet.

Intense indignation is general among opponents of the militarist faction over an assault by Captain Geroe, commandant of the guard, on Count Von Hedervary, a former premier. Geroe struck the count on the head with his saber during the worst commotion in months in the chamber. Hedervary was badly cut and today his partisans and those of Von Lukacs swear vengeance.

It is believed further turmoil in the chamber which may result in bloodshed is almost certain.

## SKYSCRAPERS IN PORTLAND FLOODED BY WILLAMETTE

PORTLAND, Ore., June 4.—The Willamette river continued to rise steadily today and has reached a stage of 23 feet above the low water mark. A rise of another foot by Sunday is anticipated.

The basements of a number of skyscrapers are flooded as the result of seepage and the operation of elevators in some of the buildings is being interfered with.

The high water is also affecting sanitary conditions, it being impossible for a number of the sewers to empty on account of the water backing up in them.

The river is now within three feet of several docks on which millions of feet of lumber is stored.

Some satisfaction is being gained from the fact that the Snake and Clearwater rivers, which empty into the Columbia, are receding, as the high water here is caused principally by back water from the Columbia.

## BRITAIN TO CONSTRUCT THREE WARSHIPS AT ONCE

LONDON, June 5.—Immediate construction of three warships provided for in the naval budget, instead of waiting until next year as had been intended, was announced today in the commons by Winston Churchill, first lord of the admiralty.

Churchill explained that the government's determination to proceed at once with the warships was caused by the rejection of Premier Borden's naval bill by the Canadian parliament.

## BRYAN AND CHINDA TO SPEAK AT BANQUET

PITTSBURGH, June 5.—At a farewell dinner here tomorrow to former Mayor George Guthrie, the newly appointed ambassador to Japan, Secretary Bryan will read a letter from President Wilson explaining his views on the California-Japanese situation. Both Bryan and Ambassador Chinda will speak.

## FITZGERALD RESIGNS FROM STATE HOSPITAL

SALEM, Ore., June 5.—The resignation of Dr. P. H. Fitzgerald, for two years superintendent of the state tuberculosis hospital, has today been accepted by the state board of control.

The board of control also formally reappointed all the heads of the state institutions.

## CHAMPION SWIMMER IS PREPARING FOR NEW MARKS



CHICAGO, June 5.—Perry McGillivray of the Illinois Athletic club in Chicago, the holder of the 440-yard and 500-yard swimming record, is preparing for the big water carnival which is to take place there in June. He will be one of the champions who will be expected to better his record.

## WALSH WILLING TO FIGHT RITCHIE

VANCOUVER, B. C., June 5.—"I am ready at any time to sign articles for a match with Willie Ritchie and I feel confident that when we do meet I will be returned the winner," declared Freddie Welsh, lightweight champion of England, who reached Vancouver yesterday afternoon. He is matched with Ray Campbell, the San Francisco boxer, for a 15-round bout at the Stevestone open air arena one week from tonight. He says he is ready to take his chances with Joe Bayley, the Canadian champion, the winner to get a match with Ritchie for the world's title on Labor day at Brighouse, near here. Ritchie has already accepted terms to box on this side of the line and if Welsh beats Bayley he will be the Californian's opponent in the squared circle.

Articles have not been signed for the Bayley-Welsh match on Dominion day, July 1. Both men are willing, but Welsh is apparently awaiting the final selection of an opponent for Ritchie on July 4 at San Francisco.

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## RITCHIE-RIVERS FIGHT CALLED OFF; BUD HAS CHANCE

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 5.—The contemplated match here July 4 between Willie Ritchie, the lightweight champion and Joe Rivers of Los Angeles, is definitely called off, according to the admission here of Promoter Eddie Graney. Following a meeting at Graney's office at 11 o'clock last night, at which the managers of the two fighters were again unable to agree on the weight question, Graney declared there was a strong probability of a Bud Anderson-Ritchie match as a substitute.

Billy Nolan, Ritchie's manager, conceded several points to Joe Levy, representing Rivers, but these were not sufficient to cause Levy to sign articles. Nolan expressed willingness to allow Ritchie to make 133 pounds at 10 o'clock on the morning of the battle.

"Nothing doing," responded Rivers' manager. "It must be 133 pounds two hours before the fight."

There was some talk of tossing a coin to settle the dispute but Levy refused.

Graney announced this morning that he would stage a battle here July 4 in which Ritchie would be one of the principals.

Promoter Jimmy Coffroth startled Graney here today when he announced his intention of entering the field on Independence Day. He has offered Manager Levy a substantial guarantee for Rivers to box Harlem Tommy Murphy and Levy is to give him an answer late today.
