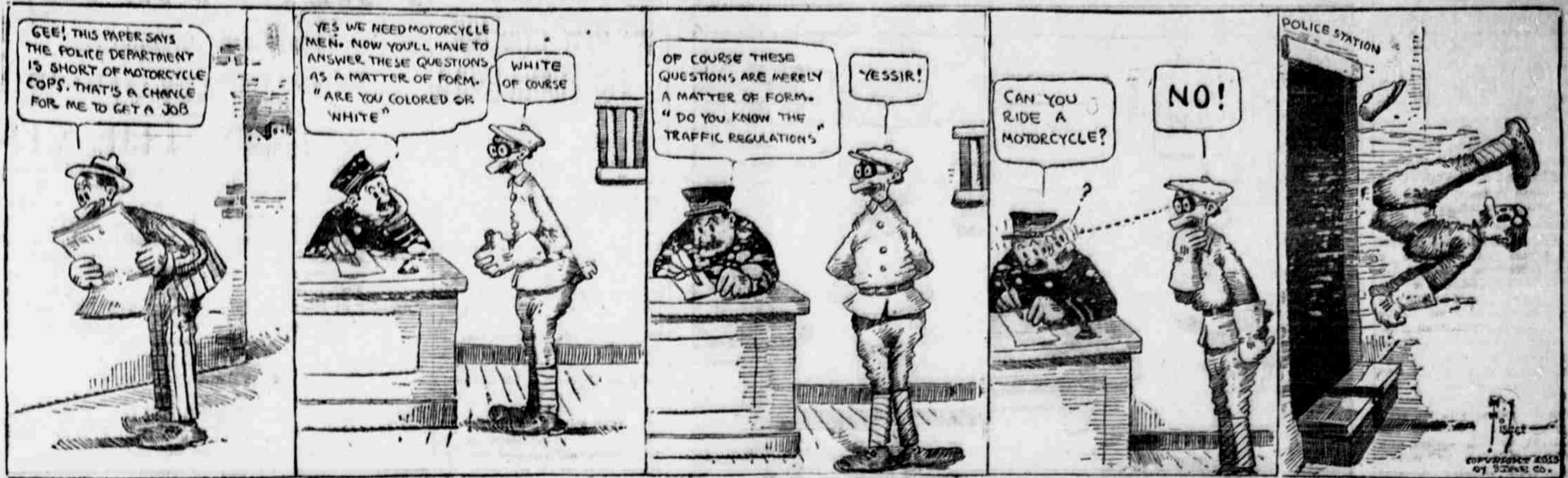


Mutt Had All the Qualifications for a Motorcycle Cop, Except One

SHIPPING FRY IN CARLOAD LOTS TO OREGON STREAMS

PORTLAND June 10.—With a shipment of carloads of young trout from Bonneville on the Columbia, 40 miles from Portland, has begun the largest distribution of fish in the history of Oregon. During the next three months from eight to ten million trout will be planted in Oregon waters. From Corvallis the season's first shipment of young pheasants are being sent out. Five thousand young birds will be distributed in all parts of the state during the next few months to the preserves volunteered by farmers.

This distribution of game, which will continue during the summer, will make Oregon a sportsman's paradise. There will be more pheasants in Oregon this fall, and they will be more scattered than before. The foregoing was the announcement of State Game Warden W. L. Finley.

Special Car Built.

A carload of young fish left Bonneville for Cottage Grove yesterday contained 180 cans of 1000 fish in each can. The car, which has recently been built especially for the purpose of distributing fish, will be operated all summer, making trips to and from the hatchery. It is equipped with tanks, and cooling apparatus for maintaining the proper temperature conditions.

In connection with it is a "puck" equipment for transporting the fish from the car to the mountain streams. Seven pack horses have been equipped with a device to carry cans. These will carry the fish to the mountain rivers, and especially to the high mountain lakes. Over 30 Oregon lakes, which because of their high altitude, have never contained fish, will be stocked with trout.

"In a few years," declared Mr. Finley, "these high mountain lakes will be the greatest recreation places in the west. They will bring people into the state. The hunting and fishing in the state of Maine is worth \$20,000,000 because of the money brought into the state by sportsmen. Hunting and fishing are already worth between \$5,000,000 and \$10,000,000 to Oregon."

"Among the more important lakes to be stocked are Marion lake, Sparks lake, Big Lake, Odessa lake, and Diamond lake. We will plant the Eastern Brook trout, the eggs of which we have brought from the east; the Rainbow, the native trout, and the Black Spotted or Cat Throat trout.

Many Birds Distributed.

"Tomorrow," Mr. Finley continued, "we will commence the distribution of from 3000 to 5000 young birds from our hatchery farm five miles north of Corvallis. We set over 7000 eggs and have had a most successful hatching season."

"We will try to distribute the birds in every portion of Oregon. The China pheasant will go to eastern and southern Oregon; the Reeves and Silver Golden pheasant to the Willamette valley. We have also 120 pairs of Hungarian partridges."

"The China pheasant is a great advertising feature for the state of Oregon. Hunters come from all parts of the United States to hunt them. Oregon is virtually the only place in the United States where they can be found. From 500 to 1000 sportsmen will come from outside states this year because of the pheasants alone."

"The China pheasant is a beautiful bird, but it is also an insect eater. It

is of actual value to farmers. Dr. Vovard, at the university, tells me that he counted 100 out worms in the stomach of one bird."

CATTLE SLOW HOG TRADE STRONG

PORTLAND, June 10.—Receipts last week have been: Cattle, 1575; calves, 39; hogs, 5189; sheep, 5827.

The cattle market is very slow. A combination of circumstances bearing prices and the fact that the market is not as strong as the previous week. Extreme high water has caused many cattle in the vicinity of Portland to be liquidated before the usual time. Heavy shipments from California and Utah have filled the yards. Best steers are selling at \$7.25 to \$7.50; cows, \$6.25 to \$6.50; bulls, \$5.50, and calves, \$8.00 to \$9. The hog trade held strong until Friday. Receipts have been very liberal and the market is from 5 to 10c lower. Best light swine steady at \$8.40.

An uneven sheep market ruled for the six day period ending Saturday. There is a fair demand for fat mutton, which is very scarce. The bulk of receipts contained nothing but poor sheep and lambs, which are slow to move. Yearlings are quoted at \$5.50 to \$5.75; two year olds, \$5.50; ewes, \$4.50 to \$4.75, and best spring lambs are steady at \$6.50 to \$6.75.
