

PROBING CAUSE OF FRUIT LOSS DUE TO BREAKAGE

For the purpose of finding exactly where the trouble lies in so many boxes of apples being broken or the fruit damaged in transit to foreign countries, the department of physical conditions of the Northwestern Fruit exchange of Portland has for several months been conducting a very exhaustive investigation on the subject of export packages for apples. The percentage of broken and damaged boxes has been entirely too large, and bruised fruit in all packages has been too much in evidence.

Extensive correspondence with its own branches in England and Germany and with a number of independent receivers in various foreign countries as well as with the principal forwarders at New York, and a comparison of their advices with the results compiled by various northwest fruit shipping concerns that have done the most extensive export business leads to the following definite conclusions:

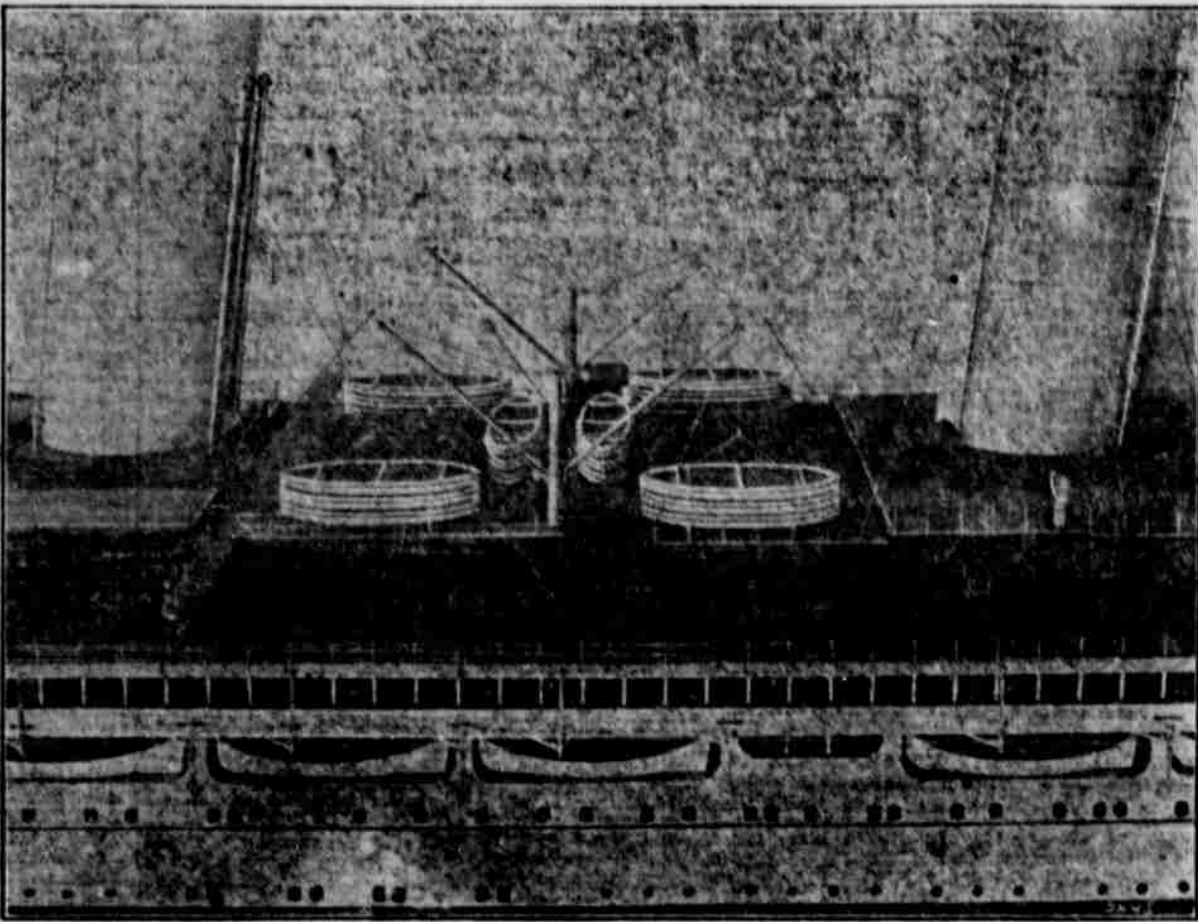
First—That there should be an improvement in the method of handling into and out of steamships. This matter has been agitated by them for some time and marked improvement has already been made by some carriers. Many other shippers are now joining in the demand, and the federal authorities are this season going to make close investigation of this subject, and we have been invited to co-operate with the department in their work.

Second—Occasionally there is carelessness in loading cars and the tiers of boxes sometimes shift and drop off onto the floor space between bulkheads.

Third—Boxing can be improved. The exchange definitely recommends that all apple boxes, whether for domestic or for export use, be in accordance with the following standards: Ends, not less than 13-15 inch; sides, 2-8 inch full, made up with six-penny cement nails; tops and bottoms, 1-4 inch scant, made up with five-penny cement nails.

For export add a double top and bottom, nailed on top of the cleats, with additional outside cleats, using seven-penny cement nails. This feature may add 3½ cents per box expense, but is cheaper than ropping or wiring and adds immensely to the

MODEL LIFE-BOAT LAUNCHING ON SS. IMPERATOR



The control of lifeboats on the modern ocean liners has been brought to a science. The best engineering skill has been devoted to devise apparatus which will lower the boats from the highest decks quickly, under every possible condition. On the SS. strength of the box and protection of the contents against bruises. Some large shippers have been so well pleased with the continued use of this style of package that they have adopted it for all domestic shipments as well. The exchange recommends that this feature be very carefully considered with a view of adopting this style or package for the special advertised brand to be marketed by certain exchange associations this year.

Fourth—In packing the tender varieties all the outside apples should be double or triple wrapped, with the corrugated pad or three sheets of blue layer board placed at both top and bottom of box.

Fifth—In packing, the apples should not be drawn down against the ends so hard as to cause any bulge of the sides.

list to either side heavily, it would still be possible to lower 75 per cent. of all the boats quickly and safely. The mechanism is operated by electricity and makes it possible to raise and lower a boat filled with passengers in less than seventy seconds. A number of the boats are collapsible, and nested, or set one above another, to economize space. In this way eighteen large lifeboats are stowed on the upper deck between two of the funnels, within reach of the cranes. An ingenious

device has also been employed for suspending boats on the lower decks, which allows them to be swung outboard and lowered in a few seconds. The great Hamburg-American Liner carries eighty-four boats capable of accommodating comfortably all of the passengers and crew. Two of these are high-powered motor-boats, which could take the others in tow. The power boats are equipped with wireless telegraph apparatus having a range of over 200 miles.

ASK NEW TRIAL ON NEW EVIDENCE FOR FRANK ESOLA

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 10.—claiming that new evidence has been discovered by them, attorneys for Frank Esola, former police officer convicted of grand larceny, appeared before Superior Judge Dunne here today and submitted a motion for a new trial.

The nature of the evidence unearthed by the defense was not divulged today, but E. C. Wright, appearing from the office of Bert Schlessinger, told the court that it would take the form of affidavits. The matter then went over until Saturday for argument on the motion.

At the calling of Esola's case from the calendar Judge Dunne read the information and then asked the defendant if he had any statement to make before sentence was imposed. At this point Wright addressed the court. Sentence was continued until after the decision was made on the motion. Attorney John Barrett will make the argument for the defense.

In court this morning were the twelve jurors who convicted Esola. The seven other accused police officers also attended the session.

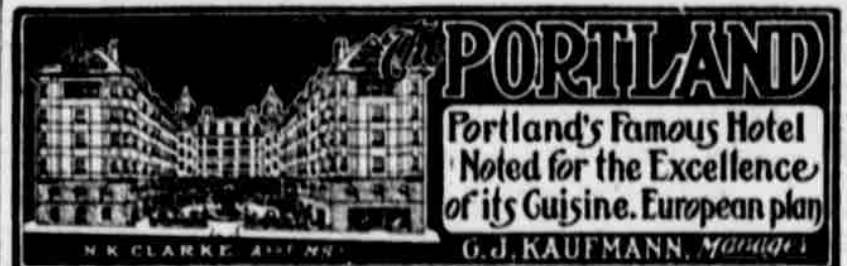
