NO FORFEITS FOR JULY 4 FIGHT ARE YET POSTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 11.—Although the Ritchie-Rivers articles of agreement have been signed, the most important part of the transaction between Managers, Nolan and Levy remains to be consummated today. Until forfeits called for by the articles are posted, the articles are not worth the paper they are written on. If a hitch occurs the whole match will be "up in the air" again.

Nolan declares himself to be ready to post his money whenever Levy is, but the latter wants time to think over the stakeholder. Levy says he wants a man equally well known to both sides, while Nolan says any responsible person will suit him.

The articles which were drawn up by Levy at Nolan's suggestion, call for a forfeit of \$2500 for weight and appearance and an additional \$1500 for appearance in the ring within twenty-five minutes after weighing in. The latter clause was inserted by Levy and without objection by Nolan, Levy evidently fearing that after weighing in Ritchie would "fudge" to gain all the strength he could. It was left to the party not at fault to take this additional forfeit or refuse to go on, as he chooses.

Nolan intended to return to his ranch last night, but delayed his departure until today, as it is his desire to settle the forfeit matter before he leaves the city.
