

ADVENTISTS MAKE PREACHERS TRAINED PUBLICITY AGENTS

WASHINGTON, June 13.—Dissemination of the gospel by ministerial press agents, who, before they give vent to oratorical teachings of the Holy Writ from the pulpit, write their sermons in advance for the newspapers, bringing forth the "high spot" in such readable manner that the editors in their respective communities will be glad to print the "church publicity" is the object of a new system inaugurated by the Seventh Day Adventists who today are holding their convention here.

Equally important with his ability to assail the devil from within the church, his knowledge of the Bible and general theology, is the Seventh Day Adventist minister's knack and knowledge of putting his "punch paragraphs" before the general public through the avenues of newspaper and magazine publicity. Every minister is henceforth to be a trained press agent for his church. To gain the knowledge of "press agenting" he is required to undergo a thorough course in the study of newspapers, editors, how to collect, write and prepare interesting news items and in general learn the intricate workings of newspaper offices.

This information is furnished in a course of eight lessons sent out from the general press bureau of the church at Takoma Park, Md., where experts on newspaper work operate the ministerial correspondence school, and where the World Conference of Adventists is now being held.

STEAMER YUKON ON ROCKS IN ALASKA

UNALASKA, Alaska, June 13.—Wireless messages received at the United States army station here state that the steamer Yukon of the Alaska Coast company, en route from Good News bay, Bering sea, to Seattle, is ashore at Cape Lazarev, Unimak island, Western Alaska. All passengers are reported safe.

The vessel went on the rocks at 11 o'clock Wednesday night, but no details of the accident or condition of the steamer were sent. The revenue cutter Tahoma also picked up the message and wireless that she was on the way to give assistance.

VANCOUVER-PORTLAND PROTEST AGAINST INITIATION

VANCOUVER, Wn., June 13.—Bud Anderson is not going to join the Medford lodge of Elks right away, at least, not as soon as his press agent said he would.

When the lightweight pugilist left his home in Vancouver, Wash., yesterday to journey to Medford, the manager of the fighter declared Bud was going to stop off at the southern Oregon metropolis to be made a member of the Elks lodge there. He was to go through tonight.

Yesterday a telegram was received here from the grand exalted ruler, Thomas B. Mills, of Superior, Wis., in which he said "Anderson will not be initiated pending a thorough investigation. The Elks order has a rule requiring applicants to membership to join the lodge in the city in which they live."

Vancouver is claimed as Anderson's home and the Elks lodge here brought that fact to the grand exalted ruler's attention when it was announced the Medford lodge proposed to take him in.

PROTEST STORY OF ADAM AND EVE

PORTLAND, Or., June 13.—Miss Jane Stearns, science teacher at the Washington high school here, is busy explaining today what she meant by telling her pupils that the Biblical story of Adam and Eve is a myth, handed down in Jewish tradition until it found a place in the book of Genesis. Miss Stearns, who tries to teach physiography so that it means more than the cramming of book lore, allowed her class to discuss the various theories of the origin of man yesterday, touching on Darwinism and other theories.

When one miss declared she would still cling to the tale of the dust and the rib, the teacher explained that this story at best was symbolic, in the light of scientific discoveries. The pupils went home and told their parents Miss Stearns was injecting higher criticism into her classroom and the parents made loud protest.

REFUSES TO GIVE UP THE RECORDS WANTED

CHARLESTON, W. VA., June 13.—Gov. Hatfield of West Virginia declined tonight to submit to the senate mine strike committee the records of trials before the military committees which took charge of the strike district of the state during the trouble this spring. In a letter to the committee the governor said the findings of the committee in these cases had never been approved, the men had never been released and he desired the records for use in seeking indictments in the civil courts. To make them public at this time he said would be "prejudicial to the public peace."

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., June 13.—Hanged to a cottonwood tree, his body riddled with bullets and then saturated with kerosene and burned, was the fate of Bennie Simmons, a negro, at Anadarko today. Simmons was accused of the murder of Susie Church, aged 16, at Cogar. A mob stoned the Anadarko jail and carried Simmons to the outskirts of the town, where he was strung up.

CORVALLIS, Or., June 13.—With a record of having laid 99 eggs in 100 days is thought to have established a record here.

The hen is a three-quarter White Leghorn and one-quarter Barred Plymouth Rock. It is a descendant of several generations of layers bred at the college experiment station here.

I. W. W. MEMBER SEEKS CITIZENSHIP

SEATTLE, Wash., June 13.—Meyer Gorelick, former I. W. W. member, who was denied by Judge Frater in the superior court not only citizenship papers, but the right to appeal from his ruling, today announced through his attorneys that he would apply to the supreme court for a writ of mandamus.

The denial of right to appeal was made yesterday on an objection by United States District Attorney Riddell. On the ground that the matter was one for the federal courts and not for the state supreme court, Judge Frater refused to sign Gorelick's notice.

Thomas R. Horner and R. B. Brown, attorneys for the alleged I. W. W. member, contended that judges in every state in the union had entertained jurisdiction in cases absolutely parallel to Gorelick's and that Frater's ruling was without precedent.

JAPAN SPENDING MILLIONS ENLARGING ARMY AND NAVY

TOKIO, June 13.—Expenditure of 16,000,000 yen for the army and navy of Japan is announced here today as part of the administration re-organization plan of Japan's finances which will call for a total expenditure of 70,000,000 yen. Ten million yen is for army betterment and 6,000,000 yen will be spent on the navy.

This big outlay was announced simultaneously with an address by Premier Yamamoto to the newspaper men, native and foreign, of Tokio. In it Yamamoto discussed the question of the California alien land law. He said he regretted deeply the fact that the dispute was still pending, but declared he hoped for an amicable solution of the difficulty. In his address he made no reference to the big new appropriations for military purposes.

EXODUS OF OREGON GROOMS TO VANCOUVER

VANCOUVER, Wash., June 13.—On account of Oregon passing a law requiring a physical examination of prospective bridegrooms, Vancouver has today broken all records for the issuance of marriage licenses, ten couples having taken out certificates in one day. Fifty-eight licenses have been issued thus far this month.

Oregon would-be Benedictus who apparently do not care to undergo the ordeal of an examination are flocking here to secure the coveted documents.

NO SIGNIFICANCE IN JAPANESE SEIZURE

TOKIO, June 13.—Viscount Chinda, Japanese ambassador to the United States, called the foreign office from Washington today requesting a report on the seizure of a yacht belonging to J. Harvey Lawder of New York on the inland sea of Japan several days ago.

The official procurator of Nagasaki issued a statement today that the "arrest of the yacht was a mere formality, and that it has no political significance."

SCHUMANN-HEINK LEAVES STAGE TO FARM

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 13.—Forsaking the stage for the soft, Mme. Schumann-Heink, the noted congress, passed through Los Angeles today en route to her 1500-acre ranch in El Cajon valley, San Diego county. The diva, it is said, will establish a permanent home on her ranch.

AUSTRALIA INTERESTED IN HYGENIC MARRIAGE

MELBOURNE, June 13.—The Dakota law recently passed in the United States, prohibiting the marriage of unfit, has aroused considerable interest in the state of Victoria. The board of public health here intends inquiring regarding the provisions of the act with a view to applying it in Victoria, if such legislation can be enacted.

LEACH CROSS ARRIVES AT LOS ANGELES

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 13.—Leach Cross, the New York dentist lightweight, is due here at 4:30 o'clock this afternoon to prepare for his twenty-round go July 4 with Bud Anderson, the sensational Medford, Or., scrapper.

Cross will go immediately to his training quarters at Doyle's camp, Vernon, Anderson, who is expected to arrive early next week, will train at Venice.
