

## GLOWING REPORTS FROM ADVENTISTS WORLD CONGRESS

The Seventh Day Adventist church in this city has received an encouraging report from the world's conference of the denomination which has just closed in Washington, D. C. The report shows great progress during the 59 years of the organization. The first Seventh Day Adventist missionary sailed for Europe in 1874 and at the present time there are 2777 evangelistic laborers outside the United States, with a total of 5082. These laborers are carrying forward their work in 86 countries, where missions have been opened, conferences organized, and schools, printing plants and sanitariums set in operation and are doing their appointed work.

The denomination now operates 40 publishing houses printing literature in 75 languages, over 100 sanitariums and treatment rooms and 600 colleges, academies and primary schools with an expenditure of \$25,000,000.

The message is being preached in 51 languages and the adherents have increased from 3500 in 1863 to 114,200 in 1912. During 1912 the European division alone gained 5484 new members.

The year 1912 realized the largest amount of funds ever raised by the denomination as well as the highest amount per capita. The amount contributed for all purposes was \$2,702,099.02 and the amount per capita was 23.65. The total amount raised by the denomination for all lines of work during the last 50 years totals \$25,718,682.56. Extensive plans were laid during the conference for the further development and progress of the work during the next few years.

## CHINESE GIRL STUDENT PREPARES FOR AIDING CHINA

DENVER, June 13.—"The women of my country need me and when I am prepared to take up the work that is ahead of me, then I shall respond to the call and abandon the customs of my people and take up those of my own." Mary Hung, a 16 year old Chinese girl, who today stands higher than her American competitors for academic honors at the Denver Manual Training high school, thus discussed her ambitions to prepare herself for a life of usefulness among her own people.

Though herself a native of Colorado she is educating herself to go back to the land of her parents and teach the women of her race advanced ideas in civilized living. She is the daughter of W. Q. Hung, a wealthy Chinese who has lived in Colorado for many years.

"The women of China need physicians of their own sex, not only to minister to them when they are ill, but to teach them how to keep well.

to live hygienic lives and to improve their mode of living generally," said the little almond eyed miss. "And because I feel called to serve them, I shall study and work until I feel that I am fitted to answer the call."

"My, no; the women of China no longer bind their feet. That custom was dropped some time ago. But there is need of much further advancement among the women of my race. Knowing this, I feel it is my duty to give them the benefit of the advantages I have enjoyed."

An unusually attractive girl in Mary Hung and thoroughly Americanized in everything. She loves to dance and ride horseback and play tennis and go to the theatre. But over in China the women do not do these things, and when this Chinese girl goes back to them she must sacrifice all the pleasures she has had in this country.
