ROCKEFELLOW—At Sisson, June 9, Eugene F. Rockefeller. He was born at Wagner Creek, known as Talent now, September 7, 1859. His early life was spent at Ashland. He was married to Rosa Eubanks, of Ashland. He leaves a family consisting of a widow, Mrs. Rosa Rockefeller, of Seattle, Wash., two sons, Done Eugene, North Bend, Ore., Dr. John Albert Rockefeller, Sisson, Cal., and a daughter, Miss Ruth R. of Seattle. A father, A. G. Rockefeller, one brother, Alfred Rockefeller, and a large number of other more distant relatives. The funeral services were held at Ashland.

The deceased was in the general merchandise business in Ashland with G. S. Butler from 1878 to 1883, and moved from Ashland to San Diego, Cal., in 1883, where he was in business for ten or twelve years. He then moved to Seattle, where the family resided.

BUD TO WIN IS AD WOLGAST'S DOPE FOR 4TH

PORTLAND, June 13.—A recent interview on the part of a Los Angeles scribe with Ad Wolgast, the lightweight champion of the world, shows that Anderson is held in the highest esteem by the doughty little German, and he predicts that he will win his bout with Leach Cross in comparatively easy fashion. "I have all of these lightweights tagged," said Wolgast recently. "This boy Cross is a wonder in 10 rounds, but he can't stand the gaff in a longer bout. I think that the public underrates Anderson, and that he will stop Cross before the twelfth round has passed.

"Ritchie has twice the punch of Rivers, and if they let him come in much over the lightweight limit of 123 pounds, he will make short work of the Mexican. I know whereof I speak in this matter, as I have met Rivers, Ritchie and Cross, and figure that I know all of these fighters well. And the people who think that Anderson is not a championship contender are mightily mistaken."

Which sounds good to the supporters of Anderson in his coming bout with Cross, as Wolgast is a keen student on dope, and his experience with each of these boys enables him to judge of their respective merits.
