PREDICTS VICTORY FOR BUD ANDERSON

N. T. Granlund, friend and admirer of Bud Anderson and manager of boxers in the east, who helped to handle Joe Mandot in his fight against Bud in Los Angeles, arrived in town this morning as advance agent for the "Hanky Panky" company. As a result of watching Anderson in his battle against Mandot Granlund formed the opinion that he is one of the world's greatest lightweights and will some day wear the lightweight crown. Granlund managed Jack Britton for Danny Morgan practically all last summer, handled K. O. Brown four years ago, and has seen all the big fights in the east, so he knows the lightweight situation thoroughly. He has been a big booster for Anderson ever since the fight in Los Angeles and has written many stories to newspaper friends in the east touting the local lad as a wonder.

"Anderson's chief asset is his wonderful kidney punch, which really whipped Mandot in the first round," said Granlund today, "and his great defense, which Mandot could not solve. The kidney punch is the best I ever saw, but he would be handicapped in fighting in the east, because the rules there bar it, particularly in New York. Cross has a great kidney punch which he used before the ruling of the commission in New York against it, and he hasn't been the same fighter since. He can use this against Anderson on the Fourth, but it doesn't compare with Bud's wallop."

"Anderson's defense is something similar to that of Jack Johnson, and the best I ever saw on a lightweight. Mandot hit him hard only four times, the last time in the third round. After that he couldn't lay a glove on him. He rushed and swung, but his right hand sweeps bounced off Anderson's left shoulder, and he couldn't get to him with a left. Try as he would he couldn't stop Anderson's kidney punches. These wallops really whipped him and had him in bad shape for several days after the fight."

"I have seen Cross fight scores of times, and believe Anderson will beat him on the Fourth. All Bud will have to look out for is Cross's snappy right, which carries a knock-out in it. If he lands with that I'm afraid of what will happen, but if Bud fights coolly and carefully, and keeps that left shoulder up, I don't believe Leach will get to him. If he beats Leach he'll be right in line for a crack at the winner of the Ritchie-Rivers' fight on the Fourth and that will give him his chance to become lightweight champion of the world."
