OFFERS TURTLE

SEATTLE, Wash., June 17 .- Dr Martin Damourette, who compounded a turtle serum several years ago which he then claimed would cure tuberculosis, and who has been reiterating his claims since Dr. Fried mann introduced his turtle serum, has offered the serum formula to the city of Seattle.

In a letter to Health Commissione J. E. Crichton, he says that his ser-um is made of blood and substance taken from a healthy turtle, to which is added certain tuberculosis bacteria killed by heat. The compound, he says, is held together by glycerine and contains no living organism.

He renews his offer to treat pa tients in the presence of a committee of physicians and says he will give the city sufficient serum to make a thorough chemical analysis.

THE INSIDIOUS LOBBY PROBE.

N causing the "insidious" lobby investigation, President Wilson has not only seriously erippled the interests endeavoring to prevent the passage of the new tariff bill, but has familiarized the general public with the methods used to thwart desired legislation.

Publicity is the great remedy for public wrongs perpetrated by special interests. Had Grover Cleveland realized it, he would not only have been able to force through his tariff bill without surrendering to the trusts, but by it, he could have prevented, by exposure, the financial conspiracy that precipitated the panic.

Publicity has not only destroyed the effectiveness of the lobby, but has exposed the connection existing between interests and legislators. It has shown how permanent lobbies are maintained at the national capital to color legislation. It has shown how this influence is obtained and extended. Its results are summarized in the Public as

(1) Protected interests have lobby headquarters at Washington directing agents throughout the country to bring pressure to bear on congress men and to spread wrong views on tariff matters.

(2) Ex-congressmen are abusing the floor privileges accorded them solicit individual aid of their former colleagues for certain interests.
