EXPOSITION WORK PROGRESSES RAPIDLY AT SAN FRANCISCO

George E. Boos returned home yesterday after spending a week in San Francisco on exposition business. Mr. Boos says: "I met a large number of our people from Medford and southern Oregon. You can find them every day congregating in the lobby of the Hotel Mana, which appears to be headquarters. All of them have big deals up in their sleeves. "The exposition is progressing nicely in every department. Over 2000 men are employed. Nine of the fourteen buildings are now under construction. The Administration building is completed and occupied; all buildings will be under contract by July 1 of this year and must be completed eight months before February 4, 1915, the opening day of the exposition. Fifteen states have already made liberal appropriations for state buildings; fourteen state legislators will meet in 1914 and it is expected that every one of them will provide for state buildings and participate in the great event. Management is Able "Every department of this great undertaking is ably conducted by men of experience who are striving to make this the greatest success in the history of expositions. The publicity and exploitation department is under the supervision of Director George Hough Perry and assisted by his chief, Colvin B. Brown. Both men are well known by the press and the public for achieving big things. They are straining every effort to exploit the Panama-Pacific International exposition, the greatest exposition known to man. "I had the good fortune to attend the San Francisco Admen banquet, where exposition matters were discussed in speeches and illustrated lectures. There I learned that the exposition work is progressing satisfactorily in every detail; that it will be much greater than the ordinary mind can grasp, and that it will be of great benefit to this country, and especially to the western and coast states, must be admitted. "San Francisco is preparing for taking care of the millions who will visit there. New hotels and large apartment houses are being built to fill up the gaps occasioned by the big fire. Street car services are being improved and new lines built and extended. Excursion boats are being constructed for the water route service to and from the exposition grounds, and one cannot help seeing that something extraordinary is going on in new Frisco. Medford Should Act "The exposition commission appointed by Governor West, who will have full charge of Oregon participation, and the expenditure of \$200,000, should be invited at an early date to visit Medford and consult with our people regarding exhibits and displays of southern Oregon, the district of the largest number of resources in the borders of the state, and the nearest neighbor to California. Let us be first to make a move, as we have been in the past, for a good representation and a share of the money to be expended. "The Canadian Pacific railway announces that all the employees of the mechanical and car departments on the company's eastern lines, some 9,500 in number, are to receive an advance of 10 per cent in wages. Time and a half will be allowed for overtime and for work on legal holidays.

FINAL ARGUMENTS IN HENWOOD CASE

DENVER, Colo., June 17.—Whether Frank Henwood on trial here for the murder of George Copeland is guilty or innocent probably will rest in the hands of the jury before eight. Arguments in the case began today. Late yesterday John Springer, husband of the woman in whose behalf Henwood killed Sylvester Von Phul, and, incidentally Copeland in a fray in the Brown Palace Hotel bar room, testified in the case. Springer declared he had investigated stories connecting Henwood's name with that of Mrs. Springer and had found that their relations were always proper. He denied the state's charge that Henwood was guilty with Mrs. Springer and shot Kid Von Phul because of jealousy. After Springer had testified he heartily shook hands with Henwood and expressed his friendship. The jury was evidently impressed. The whereabouts of Mrs. Springer, the "woman in the case," are unknown and she could not be reached by a subpoena for the defense. Springer divorced her two years ago immediately after Henwood's first trial. She then left Denver and is supposed to be living in New York.

WHITE SLAVER TRIED AT BAY CITY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 17.—Charged with importing Verna Seranton from Seattle to this city for immoral purposes, Earl Fullerton is on trial here today before Judge Farrington in the United States district court. When the trial opened Miss Seranton took the stand and told her story. She declared Fullerton brought her here from Seattle and then took her successively to Los Angeles, San Diego and Kingman, Ariz., constantly trying to induce her to support him by leading an immoral life. She declared Fullerton had induced her to give him deeds to Seattle lots valued at \$1000 and that in San Diego he pawned her diamond rings. It is expected the trial will be concluded today.
