

FISH POACHERS FOUND GUILTY BY JOSEPHINE JURY

District Attorney Kelly returned from Grants Pass yesterday, where he secured the conviction of N. W. Cole and Hal Miller, charged with violating the new Rogue river salmon law, opening the river to salmon fishing in a part of Josephine county.

Cole and Miller were caught fishing below the open water by Game Warden Sam Sandry at 1 o'clock Sunday morning with a net in the water, and were taken into custody. Cole is president of the Josephine County Fishermen's Union and the fishermen put up a hard fight on his behalf. Under the new law, the minimum fine that can be imposed is \$100, while the boat, net and equipment of the convicted men is confiscated by the state.

Sid Howell and Cal Allen, also members of the Union, were arrested on a charge of having steelhead trout in a gill net. Both Howell and Allen are government employees and the charges against them of violations on Rogue river, it is alleged, is to be investigated by the federal authorities before they are permitted to return to the government service.

The game wardens charge that Howell and Allen turned in 1900 pounds of salmon on the first day of the season and that the maximum catch for two men is about 400 pounds, the inference being that they had been seining before the river opened.

The conviction of Cole and Miller was the first conviction for violation of the game laws in Josephine county for years and the case was bitterly fought. The entire day was spent on the case, the jury not returning a verdict until 9 o'clock at night.

NEW FUNGUS ON CHOKE CHERRY

A new cherry fungus has been discovered by Professor O'Gara preying upon choke cherries in the valley, which has led many to believe that fire blight existed among choke cherries. The fungus has not yet been classified. Samples sent the United States Bureau of Plant Industry brought the following reply:

I have your recent letter and also the box of specimens of diseased choke cherry twigs. I am much interested in these specimens and in your description of the behavior of this fungus on the cherry, which is very similar to that I observed on cherries in Europe. I do not feel prepared to make a positive identification of the species, but judging from the behavior on different hosts it seems probable that there are at least two species. Whether they can be determined satisfactorily by morphological characters I am not certain. Some of our European friends, however, maintain that this can be done. It would be interesting if you could find the ascospore stage of this.

PHYSICAL VALUATION OF COAST RAILROADS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 18.—Physical valuation of every railroad between Montana on the north, New Mexico on the south and the Pacific Ocean on the west began in earnest yesterday with the arrival of Robert A. Thompson, one of the board of valuation engineers appointed under the La Follette act, who will open headquarters here and take charge of the most western of the five districts into which the country was divided by congress for the purposes of the act.

Geographically the Pacific district is the largest of the five, and the preliminary organization will be the work of months, for the task is stupendous. Over the face of the entire country, the government will employ some 2000 or more engineers, with an army of clerks under them. The final findings will be utilized by the interstate commerce commission as a basis for regulating rates.

SUFFRAGETTES PLAN MONSTER MARCH ON CITY OF LONDON

LONDON, June 18.—A monster demonstration planned by non-militant suffragettes began this morning, when, accompanied by a band, fifty peaceful suffragists left Newcastle on foot to walk to London, spreading their propaganda en route. Similar detachments are to start from different parts of England later in the week, all converging in London, where they will arrive June 26th.

Sympathizers along the route of the marchers have been requested to arrange their vacations so as to join in the demonstration. Supporters of the cause in the different cities and towns visited are expected to aid the cause in every way possible.

GOT \$400 FOR AIRSHIP SCOUTING

PARIS, June 18.—Emile Vedrines, brother of the famous airman Jules Vedrines, today received his salary for his services as air scout for Turkey in the Balkan war, during which he was a dozen times the object of the allies' long range guns. He was several times near death. Once he was slightly wounded when he flew over a Bulgarian battery. His work was of great aid in many instances to the Turks. The pay he got for his three or four months' work today was just \$400.

"The Turks are poor pay," said Vedrines today, "and I'll never work for them again. They agreed to pay me \$10,000 but when the time came gave me a promise of \$400. Really, I'm lucky to get the \$400. They say the commander of the scout cruiser Hamidieh, the only Turk ship that did anything during the war, is an American, and that they have promised him a fortune for his great work. I hope he makes the Turks—what you call it—cough up better than I did. He'd better take a tip, as you say, from me, and sail into port with his guns loaded and turn over the command after he has been paid everything due."

\$2 A TON RATE MADE ON CEMENT GOLD HILL PLANT

SALEM, Ore., June 18.—A freight rate of \$2 a ton on cement shipped from Gold Hill, in Jackson county, to Portland, and of \$1.75 a ton on the same product shipped from Greens, in Douglas county, to Portland, were authorized by the state railroad commission yesterday afternoon, following a hearing with railroad officials and representatives of the proposed cement factories.

The application for a \$2 rate from Gold Hill to Portland was made by the Southern Pacific company for the benefit of the Beaver Portland Cement company, which proposes to put up a large cement plant at Gold Hill.

At the same time C. S. Jackson of Rosburg, representing Roseburg and Douglas county interests in general and the interests of D. W. Reidle in particular, appeared at the hearing and made a request for a freight rate of \$1.70 from Greens to Portland. The commission authorized a rate of \$1.75 upon a substantial showing being made by Mr. Reidle that he is prepared to install a cement plant so he can use the rate.

The \$2 rate from Gold Hill was conditioned on the \$1.75 rate also being put into effect.

CALKINS REFUSES AMENT DAM LEASE

GRANTS PASS, June 18.—Circuit Judge Calkins has denied the petition of the Rogue River Public Service Corporation for a lease on the Golden Drift dam and pumps for the season, and Receiver Wharton will operate the irrigation plant through a joint arrangement with the water users. The broken belt has been forwarded to Portland for repair, and the pumps will be in operation again in a few days. The second belt will also be put in repair so that there will always be one pump in reserve, there being a double installation of pumps at the dam.
