

REGISTRARS FOR CITY AND WHERE YOU CAN REGISTER

Inasmuch as there are many voters in the city who do not know for sure which precinct they reside in we print the following for their information:

North Main Precinct Boundaries—Everything lying north of Main street to the county road and west of Southern Pacific railroad tract to city limits; Miss Helen Yockey, registrar, at Mail Tribune office.

South Main Precinct—All south of Main street to city limits and west of Laurel to West Eleventh street, thence east to King street, thence south to city limits; Miss J. Butler, registrar, at her residence on Main street.

Oakdale Precinct—All south of Main street, west of Southern Pacific railroad to Laurel to West Eleventh, then to King street; Frankie Edwards, registrar, corner Main and Fir street.

South Central Precinct—All east of Southern Pacific tracks as far as Bear Creek and south of Main street; E. C. Hogsett, registrar, on Central at Rogue River Abstract company.

Southeast Medford—All south of East Main street and east of Bear Creek; H. G. Shearer, registrar, 823 E. Main.

Northeast Precinct—All north of East Main street and east of Bear Creek; W. H. Humphrey, registrar, at his office on Geneva street.

North Central Precinct—All north of Main street, east of North Central and west of Bear Creek; Fred Sene-dior, registrar, Medford book store.

All voters must register before they can vote again on state or county matters and as one registration will last as long as a voter remains in the district, there is no reason for delay, in fact, those interested in a petition requesting the county judge to call an election for voting upon good roads bonds must register before the petition would be valid with their signature. So please register at once and then sign the petition.

COMMISSION MEN ENJOIN CARKINS' REGULATIVE LAW

The law regulating the commission men drafted by Representative Carkin and passed at the last legislative session, has been attacked by thirty-one commission firms in Portland who have brought suit to restrain the railroad commission from carrying out its provisions.

It is claimed that the act is in violation of the Oregon and United States constitutions. According to the complaint, two subjects are contained in the act which is unconstitutional, one being the increase of the jurisdiction of the railroad commission, and the other the regulation of commission merchants. The last provision it is claimed is prohibited by the state constitution. The plaintiffs also contend that no provision was made for protection of their interests by due process of law, for notice to them, or for any day in court or jury trial. The complaint also says that under the law taxes can be levied against certain business without a uniform rate of taxation. The plaintiffs complain that they will be injured greatly unless the injunction is granted.

ROGUE TROUT DOING WELL IN ARGENTINE RIVERS

H. I. Kelly, for the past three years in charge of the fisheries department of the Argentine Republic, spent Friday with friends in this city. Mr. Kelly left Oregon three years ago in charge of half a million salmon eggs for Argentine and during that time has put their fishing industry on a scientific basis. For years he was in charge of hatchery operations on the Rogue.

"Rogue River steelheads are doing well in certain rivers," states Mr. Kelly, "but the fish that has done the best is the eastern brook trout. They grow to an enormous size and are full of life and vim."

"Argentine is a good country, but Oregon is better and the Rogue River valley best of all. I may go back, having a six-months leave of absence but don't think I will. I don't feel at home among foreigners."

WILSON REPRESENTATIVE TO INSPECT ALASKA

SEATTLE, Wash., June 20.—Seth Mann, personal representative of President Woodrow Wilson, five newspaper and magazine writers and sixty-eight business representatives will sail from here for a forty-five day tour of Alaska Saturday evening, on the steamer Jefferson. The Matanuska coal fields will be visited as will all other points of interest in the gold camps. At Dawson the party will take a steamer for Nome, and later visit the Pribiloff Islands. On the return a visit to the volcanic islands on Seward Peninsula will be made.

AGUINALDO'S VISIT AROUSES CURIOSITY

TOKIO, June 20.—Considerable public curiosity is evident here today over the visit to Japan of the son of Emilio Aguinaldo, the Filipino rebel. Young Aguinaldo is at Kobe but so far no definite information of his mission is available.
