

### THREE COUNTIES TO GET TOGETHER FOR GOOD ROADS

That Jackson, Klamath and Siskiyou counties should get together on a good roads program is the suggestion of County Judge Wm. S. Worden of Klamath county, who has written along these lines to Judge Tou Velle. The latter has accepted the proposal and suggested a meeting in the near future, at which an agreed program of co-operative highway construction will be determined upon.

Judge Worden's letter follows:  
Klamath Falls June 20,  
County Judge of Jackson County,  
Medford, Oregon.

Dear Sir:  
It has suggested itself to me that it might be a very good thing for the county courts of Klamath and Jackson counties to meet in public meeting at, say Medford, and discuss affairs of mutual interest to both counties, namely, that of good roads. I am sure the commissioners would be glad to go to Medford with me to meet your court and I believe we could bring forty or fifty good boosters with us. If you think that such a meeting would do our common cause any good and that later we could be favored by a visit from you, I believe it would be apropos for you to invite us to come to Medford with as many of our friends as we can bring.

It seems to me that the counties of Klamath, Jackson and Siskiyou could well afford to get very close together in the matter of road construction and other things, in fact I can fail to see any competition between the three and why there should not be the most friendly feeling and get together spirit among these counties.

This letter is a desire on our part to start such a movement, and we shall be glad to hear from you at your early convenience.

We believe firmly that the southern tier of counties in Oregon should get busy and do things together. We are very glad to know that you have such good prospects on getting the California highway to your line and shall be glad to assist you. All we ask is that you do your part towards the building of a good road from Jackson county to Klamath county, and wish to assure you that we will meet you at the line.

If you care to further this movement and believe that it is wise, I shall be glad to hear from you relative thereto.

### FARMERS UNITE TO INCREASE PROFITS FARM IN COMMON

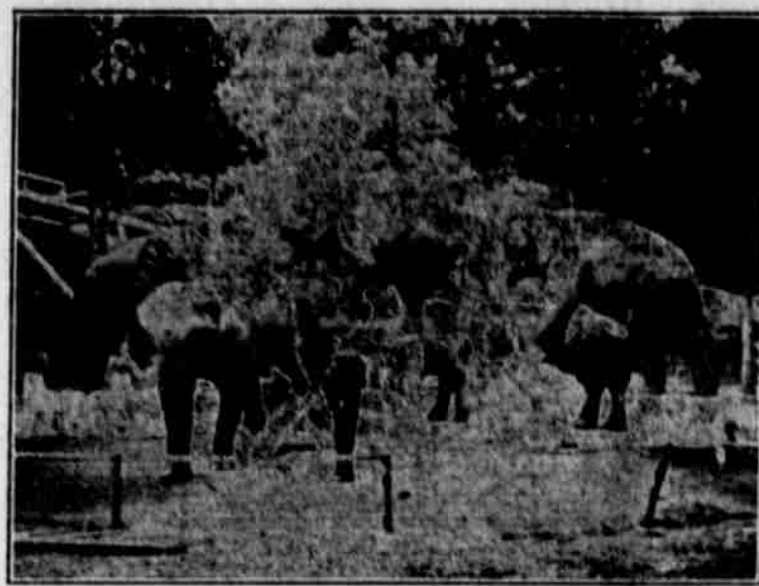
JOHNSTOWN, Pa., June 21.—Satisfied that by the use of co-operative methods the profits of their farms could be greatly increased, farmers of Adams township, one of the most picturesque agricultural sections in the Allegheny mountains, today are working out the details pursuant to forming a corporation which will control practically every acre of land in that section.

It was while a number of the husky mountaineers were discussing current topics in the village grocery store at Salix, one evening not long ago that the proposition was first suggested. That the co-operative system had been a moneymaker in other states was pointed out. Fruit growers of the Pacific states have a "trust," cotton growers have an organization in the south and in the New England and middle Atlantic states the powerful organizations of the poultry dealers and truck gardeners have flourished for many years. These facts were the principal topics of discussion in the village store for weeks. Other farmers were approached and the plan explained to them. It was an immediate "hit," and now it is learned that within a short time steps will be taken to effect a permanent organization.

The plan of the Salix farmers is to form a corporation in which all the farms in this section will be worked on the co-operative plan. Every farmer will be a stockholder in the company. He will oversee the work on his own farm, care for his own crops, and when the harvest season has arrived his farm will be visited by directors or agents of the association, who later will take charge of the produce and its sale. The farmer will get his share of the profits when the dividend is declared.

### NOW IS TIME TO RESTOCK STREAMS WITH TROUT FRY

J. E. Greive of Prospect has distributed 15,000 trout fry from the Elk creek hatchery as follows:

Two cans, South fork Rogue river; two cans, Red Blasket; three cans Mill creek, two at Prospect and one six miles above; two cans, Main river; one can, Bar creek.

As several hundred thousand fry must be liberated at once, because the capacity of the hatchery is 2,000,000 fingerlings and over 3,000,000 fry are on hand, sportsmen and farmers wishing to stock streams can secure fry the coming week. The surplus not taken will be liberated in the Rogue.

Butte creek and other ranchers as well as those on the upper Rogue, are urged to take advantage of the opportunity at once. Cans will be supplied at the hatchery.

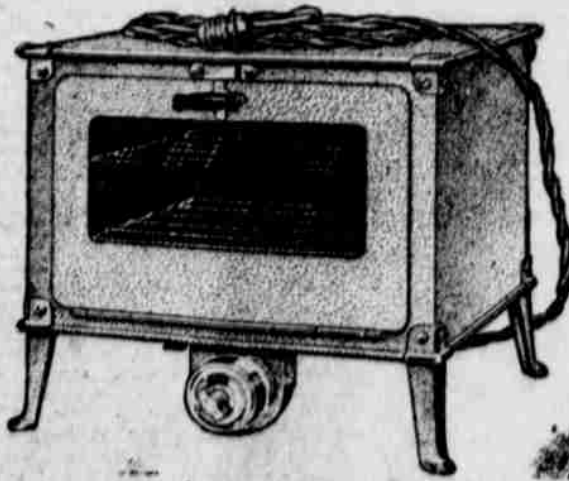
