## FOLSOM LIFER UNDER SENTENCE OF DEATH

## MOTHER CONVICTED OF SON'S MURDER

SEATTLE, Wash., June 26.—In the absence of a law by which Hindus can be barred from the United States, rigid enforcement of the new regulations governing the applications of persons from insulin possessions for admission into this country, is being made here by immigration officials to stem the tide of Asiatics.

Heretofore, citizens of the Philippines have found it easy to secure admission. In March the steamship Minnesota brought over 165 Hindus from Manila, who had no trouble in landing and as a result Hindus bound for this country are flocking to the Philippines.

Examination of two hundred Hindus who arrived on the Minnesota Wednesday is proceeding today. The number to be deported will not be known until the work of the examiners is completed. Certificates from the port of Manila are demanded and in their absence the passenger will be deported, not to the Philippines, but to India. Financial condition and ability to earn a living under conditions here, is also considered.

## S. P. BONDS FIXED IN LAND APPEAL CASE

PORLTAND, June 26.—Judge Wolverton in the federal court today fixed at \$100,000, the bond of the Southern Pacific railroad company in its appeal from the decree of the same judge in declaring forfeited to the government 2,300,000 acres of land in Oregon and California.

The amount of bond was placed at the recommendation of B. D. Townsend, special assistant to the attorney general, who investigated charges that the railroad was not complying with the terms of the government land grant and instituted a suit which resulted last April in Judge Wolverton's order that the land reverts to the United States.

The standing of numerous settlers on this vast tract is involved in the litigation, many having taken claims on the understanding that when the reversion took place they would have earned prior rights to prove up on homesteads. This view is not held by Lewis Sharp, of the local land office, who declares the land must be formally thrown open to entry by congressional enactment before settlers may establish any claim whatever.

## WOMEN ENGAGE IN "DRY" CAMPAIGN

SEATTLE, June 26.—The Washington women's government committee is preparing for a campaign to be begun in the fall in support of the statewide prohibition law which is proposed to be secured by the initiative at an election to be held in 1914.

Detailed plans of the preparatory work which were discussed at the meeting of the legislative committee yesterday afternoon at the residence of Mrs. J. M. Winslow, include the printing and mailing of literature to 40,000 women in King county, which it is estimated will cost \$1,000.

Circulation of the petitions must begin as soon as possible after the first of the year, according to those in charge of the work.

## Ask Gerard's Status Quo.

WASHINGTON, June 26.—The state department today inquired whether Justice James Gerard, of the New York supreme court, would be persona grata at Berlin. He probably will be the next ambassador.

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 26.—Samuel E. Swearingen, life convict, is today awaiting sentence of death for assault with a deadly weapon upon William Robinson, a fellow prisoner, having been found guilty by a jury here.

The sentence will be hanging, Swearingen being the fifth convict in the state to be convicted under the law which provides the death penalty for lifers who assault fellow convicts. Jacob Oppenheimer sentenced to hang July 11, was the first to be convicted under this law.

Swearingen attacked Robinson with a knife at Folsom after receiving a life sentence for the murder of his wife and a baby in Alameda county.

SPOKANE, Wash., June 26.—Mrs. Mary Johnson was found guilty of the murder of her son, Raymond Johnson, this morning, by a jury which returned a first degree verdict. Although the evidence throughout the trial was condemning, charging that she put strichine in the boy's food, the mother maintained a stoical aspect and even when the verdict was read, manifested no

Today's conviction is the first time in many years that a woman has been found guilty of first degree murder.

## U. S. GRANT, JR. WILL MARRY MARSHALLTOWN, IA., WIDOW

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 26.—U. S. Grant, junior, today admitted the report that he would soon wed Mrs. A. B. White, widow of Marshalltown, Iowa. Announcement of the engagement has been expected by intimate friends for some time. This will be Grant's second marriage, his first wife, a daughter of Senator Jerome Chaffee, of Colorado, having died several years ago. Grant is 61 years of age.

**California Bars Sicily Lemons.**

SACRAMENTO, Cal., June 26.—Warning has been issued by F. R. M. Bloomer, quarantine guardian, that all Sicily lemons are barred from the state, on account of the prevalence of the Mediterranean fruit fly. The penalty is \$500 fine, six months imprisonment, or both.
