

NAME FIRE PATROL FOR 1913 SEASON

At a meeting of the Jackson County Fire Patrol association held Wednesday, forest patrolmen for the 1913 season were chosen the appointments to become effective at once. This action is in conformity with the protection policy of the association adopted last spring and is an increase in patrolmen over 1912.

The appointments are:

George F. Hall and Erwin McCall, Prospect; Arthur Moore, Persist; Ed Walker, J. I. Patton, Jack Moore and Joe Gippert of Butte Falls; John Winningham, Trail; Al Conrad and George R. Moon, Medford, and C. E. Closser, Ashland.

The June rains, heavier than usual, have dispelled any danger of forest fires in this section for several weeks, the ground and underbrush being soaked. It is also predicted that by reason of the rain, the timber loss in Southern Oregon will be below 1912—the lowest year for losses.

CALIFORNIA BLUE SKY LAW UNDER FIRE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 26.—Over one hundred referendum petitions against the new blue sky law are in circulation here today and are being freely signed.

J. T. McBean, secretary of the California Association of Investment Corporations, has issued orders for the employment of 450 women voters to circulate the petitions in Los Angeles. It is expected that by Saturday the petitions will be in circulation in every county in the state. Southern California is being handled from Los Angeles.
