MYSTERIOUS WOMAN IN MURDER CASE

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 27.—Detectives employed in investigating the murder and robbery of C. E. Pendell, wealthy money lender here, who was killed and his office robbed of \$100,000 in money and jewels, today have asked the Chicago authorities to co-operate with them, believing that the murderers of Pendell may be the same gang who murdered J. H. Logue, the Chicago money lender, under strikingly similar circumstances.

Y. C. Fuentes, an attorney who occupies offices adjoining those of Pendell, saw a handsome woman of about 35, accompanied by a smooth shaved slender man of 40, leave Pendell's office at 2 o'clock on the day of the crime. Pendell was never again seen alive. It will be remembered that a mysterious woman visited Logue in Chicago shortly before his death. The evidence presented by Fuentes is given weight because neither the man or woman have come forward to explain their visit to Pendell despite the offer of \$100 reward for anyone who had visited Pendell Wednesday afternoon.
