

ALL KINDS OF FLOWERS SOUGHT FOR FLOWER SHOW

Not only roses, but all kinds of flowers are wanted for the Fourth of July Flower Show.

The awards committee of the Flower show wishes to state that no rose, otherwise perfect, will be disqualified for exhibit if the foliage is mildewed. Owing to the late heavy rainfall, many of the roses in town are suffering from mildew.

At the show there will be demonstrated sprays which will remedy this trouble.

This flower show is meant to be mostly educational and for that reason will want every variety grown in Southern Oregon exhibited. Bring in your flowers even if you have but one perfect bloom.

All those having roses whose names are unknown to them are asked to bring them also. The judges will name the roses.

A special request is made for exhibits of all the different flowers grown in Medford. Dahlias, Sweet Peas, Gallardia, etc., are wanted. Separate tables and blue ribbons will be provided. There will be no charges, but exhibitors will please bring in their own vases. All will be cared for and returned. The exhibits are to be in place by 11:00 a. m. on the Fourth. The judges will finish their work by twelve, and the rooms will be opened then to the public. A rest room will be provided for mothers with babies. The Flower Show will take place in the Sparta building, the use being donated by John M. Root.

MOTHERS ASKED TO BRING BABIES TO HYGIENIC SHOW

Everyone should see the Better Babies' show held in the Sparta building on July Fourth by the Hygiene section of the Greater Medford club. All mothers are asked to exhibit their babies, and not to bring only the ones which will win a prize.

A committee of doctors, baby specialists and nurses will examine each baby. If the baby has any defect which can be remedied the committee will tell what to do. Next year mothers may then take a prize with the same baby.

The club believes the Rogue river valley has the finest babies in the world and desire to find one with a perfect score.

No fee is charged. Score cards will be given to each baby and a copy will be filed for record by the club.

Every mother should have her baby's name among those filed. There are three classes, under one, two and three years. Prizes are being shown in Martin J. Reddy, the jeweler's, window.

ASK MORE ENTRIES FOR BIG PARADE

Many additional floats have been entered by merchants and others and the indications now point to a parade of much greater proportions than was at first anticipated.

BOWLBY COMING TO AID COUNTY IN ROAD BUILDING

State Highway Engineer H. L. Bowlby will arrive in Medford Tuesday to take up with the county court the proposed system of improved roads to be constructed under a bond issue.

The state law compels the county court to designate where the money raised by bonding the county will be spent and to specify the amount for each highway. In order to ascertain the best division of the expenditures and the estimates of cost, the county court has requested Major Bowlby's assistance and he will have supervision of the preliminaries as well as advise the court on all matters pertaining to road building, materials and designs.

All persons who have not registered as voters and who have not signed the election petition to the court, are requested to do so once, in order that the court may act on the matter at its July meeting.

ASHLAND CANYON ROAD COMPLETED

Supervisor M. L. Erickson of the Crater National Forest, has returned from a trip of inspection over the new auto road built by the Forestry Bureau as a scenic highway up Ashland canyon, from the park, three miles to a lower saddle of Mount Ashland, at a cost of \$6000.

"This is the finest mountain road in Oregon," states Mr. Erickson, "but I do not think the forestry service will build any more automobile highways. Hereafter, the department will probably confine itself to trails."

It will be remembered that the Forestry bureau by unfavorable report, killed Senator Chamberlain's bill to improve the Crater Lake highway in the National forest, money which was to be allotted outside the forestry bureau's funds, on the ground that auto roads were not needed in forest reserves, and then sanctioned the use of \$6000 of forestry funds for the construction of the Mount Ashland auto road.

GRANTS PASS WINS CLASSY GAME BY SCORE 6 TO 5

Judging by the classy manner in which the Medford club handled itself at Grants Pass yesterday afternoon, the games with the fast Montague team on the Fourth, fifth and sixth of July should be worth going miles to see. The local nine was handicapped for want of a regular first baseman and Pitcher McKeever covered the initial sack until the seventh inning, when he was relieved by Harper, who had played centerfield.

Score: Grants Pass 6, Medford 5.

Miles' Two-Bagger

In the third inning Manager Miles drove out a two-bagger, scoring Harper and Scholz, and later reaching home himself. This should have won the game for Medford as with the exception of McKeever on first the men played big league ball. Horton, Scholz and Miles being in fine form and Hurd pitching nine steady innings. Medford had the game safe 4 to 0, when Grants Pass went to bat in the fourth, but were unable to retain the lead. Grants Pass later making it 5 to 4, when Medford made the greatest rally ever seen on a southern Oregon diamond and tied the score. Grants Pass getting their sixth and last run with two men out in the ninth inning.

"Doc" Horton's sensational and successful slide to home in the third was the big feature of the game.

The Grants Pass regular battery was relieved in the third inning by Wilson and McIntyre, the "Homeless Battery."

Hill and Hurd went the nine innings in good shape.

Story of the Runs

The runs were made thus: In the third, for Medford, after McKeever had fanned, Harper dumped one near the home plate and was safe when Crawford dropped Frye's assist; Scholz doubled to center; Miles doubled to left, scoring Harper and Scholz; Horton, by fast sprinting and doing the unexpected, stretched his drive to left into a double, but Miles was held at third; Gill singled to center, scoring Miles. Here Roper called McIntyre, the Central Pointer, from second to the pitcher's box. Herbig went to second and "Curly" Wilson came from right

field to catch, swapping positions with Wade. Antle flew to Riggs and Horton scored after the catch. Hill forced Antle. Four hits, 4 runs.

Grants Pass scored its first run in the fifth, when, with two down, Herbig doubled to left. Crawford grounded infield, and the play was made on him, but it failed by an eyelash. Herbig scoring, and Crawford getting credit for a single. Two hits, one run.

Pass Pass Two More Over

Grants Pass put over two more in the sixth. Wilson was hit by a pitched ball; McIntyre forcing Wilson, Scholz and Miles executing a brilliant, but freakish and lucky play; Sweetman singled to center McIntyre taking third and Sweetman second on the play to catch the former; Al Schmidt doubled to left, scoring McIntyre and Sweetman; Riggs grounded out, Scholz to McKeever. Three hits, two runs.

Roper took the lead in the seventh, but it was not Hurd's fault. Faubion, pinch-hitting for Mattico, drove an easy grounder to McKeever, which the elongated first baseman juggled; Herbig sacrificed Faubion to second; Crawford was safe on Miles' momentary juggle of his grounder, Faubion going to third; Wilson lifted a long fly to Antle and Faubion scored the tying run on the throw-in; McIntyre drove to Horton, whoseasty and none too accurate throw was muffed by McKeever, Crawford scoring; Wade walked and Sweetman singled to center, but Schmidt ended Medford's agonized inning by flying to Scholz. One hit, two runs.

Evened Up in Eighth
Miles' indomitable cohorts evened

up the score in the eighth. Osborn went to short in place of Mattico. Scholz singled to left, but "Curly" threw him out stealing; Miles lined to McIntyre; Horton walked and stole second, "Shorty" kidded "Curly" and danger impended; Gill singled to center and the apothecary ran home.

But Grants Pass won in the last half of the ninth. Crawford singled to right and Wilson to left. McIntyre's hurtling grounder was grabbed by Scholz who, aided by Miles and Harper—the latter had replaced McKeever at first—doubled Wilson and McIntyre, Crawford going to third, from where he scored on Wade's

single to center. Three hits, one run.
