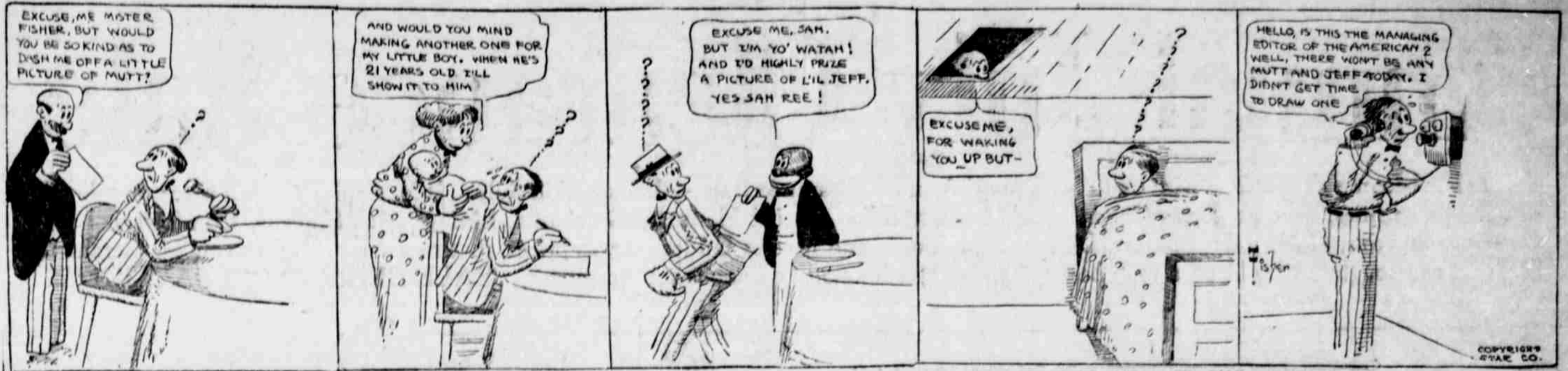

HOG PRICES GAIN 80 CENTS IN WEEK BREAKING RECORDS

PORTLAND, June 30.—Receipts for the week have been: Cattle, 1529; calves, 278; hogs, 2786; sheep, 489; horses, 23. Cattle market steady in strong all week. The general run of steers has been above the average in quality, the bulk selling \$7.75 to \$8.25. Several loads of California grass cattle sold at higher prices. The steers in this shipment brought \$8.75, the heifers \$8.00 and the calves \$9.00. Outlet has been very good and the market seems to be on a very sound basis. There is a poor demand for stockers and feeders on account of the high water, which condition will be eliminated in the near future. The hog trade surpassed all records since 1910 for a single week. Prices made a sharp gain of 80 cents in seven days. Market opened strong Monday, which was a 20 cent gain over the previous week, and by Friday top quality light swine was selling at \$9.00. Receipts have been very liberal but buying has been on a large scale and the supply was quickly absorbed. Transactions in the sheep house have been very few due to the light receipts and slow demand for mutton. Extra choice yearlings are worth \$4.75 to 5 cents and ewes \$4.50. The lamb trade is in very fair shape and prime fat spring stock has had a good outlet, prices ranging from \$6.00 to 6.75.

UNCLE SAM ISSUES GUIDE BOOK FOR CRATER LAKE PARK

WASHINGTON, June 30.—Methods of seeing the wonderful Crater Lake National Park in Oregon, the principal attraction of which is a beautiful lake situated in the crater of an extinct volcano, are described in a circular entitled "General Information Regarding Crater Lake National Park, Season of 1913," just issued by the department of the interior. This park is situated on the summit of the Cascade range in south-central Oregon. It has an area of 159,300 acres and is located in the midst of a beautiful mountain country, the principal attraction being Crater Lake, a body of water having an area of 29 1/4 square miles (water surface) which is situated in the caldera of an extinct volcano. The lake is surrounded by unbroken cliffs which range from 500 to nearly 2000 feet in height. The coloring of the water and of the surrounding cliffs presents some of the most striking pictures seen in the western mountain country. This circular, which may be obtained on application to the secretary of the interior, contains a tourist map of the park, information concerning hotels, camps and principal points of interest, a list of books and magazine articles, and the rules and regulations for the reservation.

PORTLAND, Ore., June 30.—Automobile fans are still gasping today over the thrill they got at the country club track yesterday afternoon when "Wild Bob" Burman, the racing demon, shattered the world's record for the mile, flying start, by making the circular course in 48.1 seconds. Shrook, state deputy dairy and food inspector, has just made his report on the meat markets and bakeries in Medford and surrounding towns and the result is not particularly complimentary to this city. The score card used is based on 100 points for a perfect plant, 40 of which are based on perfect construction, and 60 on perfect methods and cleanliness.
