

SINGLE STANDARD IN MORALS URGED PORTLAND SESSION

PORTLAND, Ore., July 1.—The single standard, more rigid prosecution of white slave law violators, and suppression of the social evil in every city and hamlet in the world are the object of the second World's Christian Citizenship Conference which is in session in the great stadium of the Multnomah Athletic Club.

Among the foreign speakers are Robert J. Patterson of Belfast, Ireland; John Lamond of Edinburgh, Scotland; Dr. Charles Merle d'Aubigne of Paris; Monsieur de Rougemont of Neuchâtel, Switzerland; Signor Davide Busto, Royal Army of Italy, Rome; Professor Theophil Mann, Frankfort-on-Main, Germany; Dr. Edward Sverdrup, Christiania, Norway; President Armonas, Halgaland, Konia, Turkey; Ng Poon Chew, Canton, China; Dr. J. Sagunoshin Motoda, Tokio, Japan; Dr. J. A. McDonald, Toronto, Canada; Kwang Yuen Lee, Korea; William Hay, New Zealand. These men expect to tour the United States on lecture trip following the close of the eight-day gathering.

This morning Dr. J. S. McMunn, of East Greenwich, New York, presided at the session devoted to "The Family," and reports of the commission appointed at the first world's conference will be made by Professor R. C. Wylie of Pittsburgh. Discussion will be led by M. d'Aubigne, Edwin H. Deik of Philadelphia, and James M. George of Kansas City. The peace conference will be presided over by Dr. J. Boggs Dodds of Sterling, Kansas. Professor Edward Krehbiel of Leland Stanford University, California, will report for the peace commission. Addresses will be made by Dr. Scott Bates of St. Paul, Professor Theophil Mann and James A. Macdonald. The section meeting devoted to capital and labor will be presided over by R. M. Downie, of East Beaver Falls, Penn., and Dr. Charles Steidle will report for the commission. Dr. A. J. McKelway, of Washington, D. C., will discuss child labor and Arthur E. Wood, of Portland, Ore., will take up western phases of the labor problem.

Wednesday's sectional conferences and the chairman will be public education, Dr. William Foster, of Portland; prison reform, Governor Oswald West, of Oregon; intemperance, Bishop Charles Scadding, head of the Oregon diocese of the Episcopal church; social purity, Dr. A. S. Stewart, of Seattle.

BREAKS ARM IN BATTLE WITH SALMON

GRANTS PASS, July 1.—A battle with a giant salmon at the pool below the Golden Drift dam proved the undoing of H. A. Simmons, and as a result Simmons now carries his left arm in a sling and will be out of the game until the broken bones are repaired by Dame Nature with the assistance of Dr. Loughbridge. Simmons had hooked the monster chinook and after playing him to a finish was drawing him to shore when the hook tore out, and Simmons made a grab for the fish floundering in the shallow water. Slipping on the rocks, Simmons struck his elbow on a boulder, breaking the bone below the elbow and also chipping a piece of the bone from the elbow itself. It was a serious break, but even in the excitement of the accident, the chinook was saved, Scott Hamilton coming to the rescue and holding the fish down until assistance arrived.
