LIVES IN LONDON ON 6 CENTS A DAY

LONDON, July 2.—The problem of the high cost of living has been solved by F. J. Cross, a food reformer here, who by experimenting on himself, has proved that a man can live in England "in perfect health and enjoyment" on six cents a day.

This was his food supply for a week, as he told the Charity Organization society: Three loaves of bread, one pound of oatmeal, one pint of milk, one pound of beans, one pound of dates, one pound of rice, five ounces of oleomargarine, two ounces of lard, half a pound of potatoes, half a pound of sugar and one and one-half cents worth of tea, pepper and salt.

CAESAR'S PLACE CLOSED ONLY TO BE REOPENED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 2.—After issuing an order closing the doors of Caesar's Grill, famous on the Barbary Coast, known to elite San Francisco society and a former rendezvous for bunco men, San Francisco's police commissioners early today drew the teeth from the order by the adoption of a resolution permitting Sebastian Ravani, Caesar's partner, to apply for a liquor license to conduct a cafe on the same premises. Commissioner Kuhl voted the only dissenting voice.
