Seek Exhibits of Jackson County for Land Shows. The Oregon State Immigration Commission wants Jackson county to prepare an exhibit to represent the state in the eastern land shows this fall.

Packing Suggestions. The local organizations and growers are required to go to no expense other than that of gathering the specimens and getting them to the depot.

Expense and Credit. Pack with great care. These are not ordinary shipments, but are the cream of the country that are going to compete against the cream of the country from other states.

Gathering Wheat Sheaves. Sheaves of wheat should be gathered before the grain is so ripe as to shatter badly, and yet late enough to be properly colored.

Fruits and Vegetables. Most fruits should be left on the tree until sufficiently colored but picked before thoroughly ripened.

Unwashed Potatoes. Potatoes necessarily are the best exhibit material of the root crops. Above all do not wash potatoes. It is much better to clean with a brush.

Alfalfa Exhibit. Alfalfa is a nice exhibit crop if properly grown and selected. A fine

LAND GRANT FORFEITURE.

JUDGE WOLVERTON has signed the decree in the case of the United States against the Oregon & California railroad company, whereby the railroad's claim to two million acres of land are forfeited.

The decision is of particular interest to the citizens of Jackson county for the reason that practically every township in the county is affected. Over 438,000 acres of land situated in Jackson county are by the express provisions of the decree declared to be forfeited to the United States and the title to all of these lands by operation of the decree passes from the company to the government.

None of these lands will be sold or can be acquired until the final decision of appeal. Certain parties are making the assertions that they have the right to take filing fees and that they can secure title to the lands by virtue of making filings thereon.

Many swindles along these lines have been operated in the past few years and every few days comes news of fraudulent operations by locators who are still busy reaping the sucker crop.

Suffragette Violence Due to Oppression

LONDON, July 3.—"To use force to subdue a popular rising, and at the same time to make no effort to remove the grievances causing the rising, is to stoke the fires of rebellion while sitting on the safety valve."

"Suffragists, like myself," she said when interviewed today, "who find themselves conscientiously unable to subscribe to real, as opposed to technical, violence (official or otherwise), can nevertheless feel respect and admiration for the character of those who, like Joan of Arc, Hampden, Garibaldi, and a host of heroic souls in the past, think violence justifiable in the service of a great end and have lately acted upon this belief, to the public inconvenience, it is true, but at terrible cost to themselves.

Vegetables should not be bruised or marred in any way. Leaf tops should not be cut off closer than three or four inches to the vegetable. Most vegetables—should be cleaned dry rather than washing. In this way they will keep longer and look brighter.

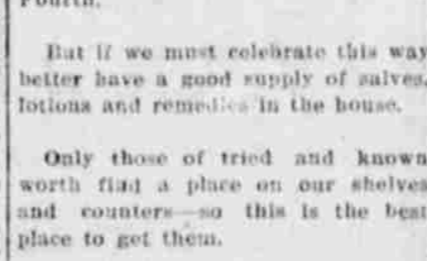
