

### CROWDS FLOCK FROM ALL POINTS FOR CELEBRATION

A large crowd from all parts of the valley gathered in Medford to celebrate the Fourth. The postponement of the auto races until 4 o'clock, when they were run off at the fair grounds instead of Central avenue, aroused considerable disappointment, but Mayor Efort, on protest of citizens, and on account of the violation of agreement by auto drivers in stripping cars, refused to permit the use of the streets, lest accident result.

The crowd was a good-natured one and flocked to the ball grounds and race track, the flower show and other entertainments. There was a steady stream of visitors to the flower and baby show, where a most attractive exhibit was arranged.

### STEAMER SEATTLE IN DISTRESS OFF COOS BAY BAR

**MARSHFIELD, Ore., July 4.**—In a leaking condition and believed to be in danger the steamer City of Seattle from Puget Sound, in tow of the steamer Chatham is outside Coos Bay awaiting assistance. The light-house tender Manzanita went outside the bay about noon to give aid to the distressed vessel and two her in but the Chatham with her tow continued south although having been informed by wireless that help was coming. A fishing boat which communicated with the steamer this morning reported that they needed help at once.

**SEATTLE, Wash., July 4.**—The steamer City of Seattle reported in distress off Coos Bay is an Alaskan liner and does not run south. The old West Seattle ferry "City of Seattle," was recently sold to a San Francisco transportation company and is now being towed to San Francisco. This probably is the vessel in distress.

The two were taken in custody by the authorities yesterday.

### LISTED FRIENDS AND ENEMIES OF MANUFACTURERS

**WASHINGTON, July 4.**—Letters submitted to the senate lobby committee by Martin M. Mulhall, of Baltimore, to sustain his sensational charges against big business, show that the National Association of Manufacturers kept lists of its friends and enemies. Senators and congressmen favoring any sort of labor legislation were put on the list as enemies, and the manufacturers, Mulhall alleges, opposed their reelection.

Other letters addressed to Mulhall instructed him "to make it too hot for Senator McComas, of Maryland, to be comfortable," in a political campaign against the lawmaker.

It was expected today that the lobby committee will retire David Lamar, the New York broker, from the limelight, but it is not believed a subpoena will be issued for J. P. Morgan, Jr.

Senator Overman, chairman of the lobby committee, and the other protesters spent the Fourth away from Washington.

### AMERICAN FLAG TRAMPLED IN DUST

**WINNIPEG, Man., July 4.**—The American flag was trampled in the dust on the main street of Winnipeg today.

The unpleasantness occurred when soldiers were returning from their annual encampment and marched down the street. Suddenly a young American stepped to the curb and waving the American flag, shouted: "Hurrah for the American eagle!"

Colonel J. H. Mitchell, commanding the troops, ordered a soldier to request the American to put away the flag. Before the order was fulfilled, however, civilians surrounded the American, snatched the flag from his hand and trampled it in the dust. The American was rescued from the mob.

### TWO KILLED IN RACE RIOT, TACOMA

**TACOMA, July 4.**—A Mexican, who gave his name as Joe Moonlight, and Joseph Porter, members of the "stampede" troupe, were shot early today by an unknown negro on a downtown street. The Mexican was struck above the heart and physicians at the county hospital say he cannot recover.

Porter, a cowboy from Texas, was shot in the side and twice through the right arm. He declared the shooting arose over an argument on the race question. It is said the negro fired immediately after Porter said: "I'll tell you what we do with you fellows down in our country."

After the shooting, the negro escaped, despite the fact that a large crowd of merry-makers on the street pursued him.

Porter, lying on a cot in the hospital, called for pencil and paper, and wrote: "Good bye, Dave. Will see you in H."

The fireman resisted, and one of the bandits knocked him into unconsciousness with the butt of a revolver. The crew was intimidated by their threats to throw them into the Tallahatchie river nearby. A few shots were fired to frighten the passengers. The robbers boarded the train at Memphis.
