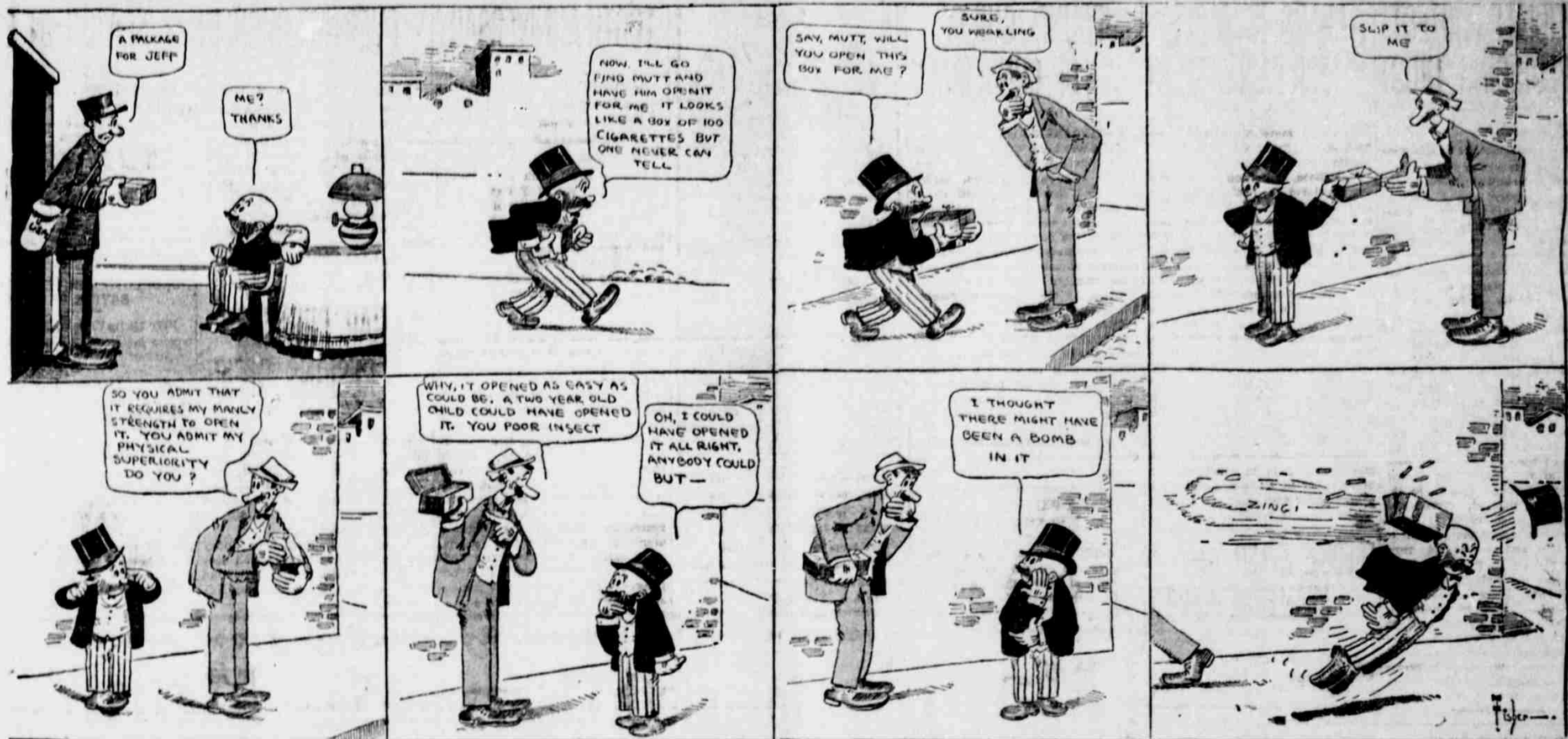


Jeff Takes No Chances When Mutt Is Around
