PANAMA FAIR BOARD NAMED

SALAS, Ore., July 5.—A committee appointed by the last legislature for the purpose, today selected Robert A. Booth, of Lane county; C. L. Hawley, of Polk county; W. L. Thompson, of Umatilla county; O. M. Clark and John F. Logan, of Multnomah county, as members of the Oregon Panama Pacific exposition commission.

This committee will have charge of the expenditure of the appropriation made by the legislature for the construction of an Oregon state building and the installing of a suitable exhibit at the Panama Pacific exposition at San Francisco in 1915.

WORKS HAS BILL TO REFORM SERVICE

WASHINGTON, July 5.—A bill creating a commission of three to consider all applications for office and recommend all persons named for non civil service positions will be introduced in the senate Monday by Senator Works, of California. Each commissioner will receive \$3000 annually and have absolute authority.

NO IRRIGATION IS NEEDED FOR SHEEP

WASHINGTON, July 5.—Sheep on the Nebo national forest, Utah, go four and a half months without water except for such moisture as they get from the dew and the juices of forage plants.

Grazing sheep on a range entirely destitute of water is a recent innovation due to the increasing demand for forage and the efforts of the forest officers to find a place on the forest ranges for all the stock that can safely be admitted. The area on the Nebo which has now proved usable by sheep is high and rocky, a portion of it being above timber line, and it has neither springs nor streams of sufficient size or accessibility to be used for stock watering purposes. The grazing season lasts from June 15 to October 31, and during this period of four and a half months the animals do not get a drink.

Under such conditions, however, the sheep have done extremely well, and last year's lambs from this range had an average weight at the close of the season of 68 pounds on the Chicago market, which was rather above the normal weight from that vicinity.

In one area on the Targhen forest in Idaho sheep get water only twice during the four-months summer grazing season. There is no water on the range, but the sheep are driven to a nearby stream lower down the mountain side. Lambs from this range weighed 65 pounds on the Chicago market.

BULGARS SUSTAIN CRUSHING DEFEATS TURKS NEUTRAL

BELGRADE, July 5.—Despatches received at the war office here tonight report that the Bulgarians were repulsed with heavy loss when they attempted to invade Serbia at Zajecar, a town on the frontier. Many prisoners were taken by the Servians.

SALONIKA, July 5.—After heavy fighting Greek troops today expelled a Bulgarian force from the town of Lahama on the railroad between Salonika and Sorres. The position is considered important.

VIENNA, July 5.—Official sources declare, that in return for concessions made by Bulgaria in the war indemnity, Turkey has agreed to remain neutral in the present Balkan conflict.

CANADIAN BANK CLERKS ROBBED OF \$2500 IN COIN

NANAIMO, B. C., July 5.—Two bank clerks of Cumberland were held up at Trent Bridge and robbed of a sum said to be in the neighborhood of \$2500 late yesterday.

They were returning to Cumberland from a branch of the bank which operates on Fridays at Union Bay. The robbers stepped in front of their rig and at the point of a gun forced the clerks to get out and travel in opposite directions. The bandits are said to be foreigners.

Two Swedes, believed to be the bandits, are surrounded near Union Bay and the police are expected to make them captives today. They are well armed.
