OAKLAND, Cal., July 11.—"I direct after my apparent death that my heart shall be removed from my body, my remains kept for several days, and then cremated." Fear that she might be buried alive prompted Mrs. Adelaide Sherwood Soule, whose late husband was a professor in the University of California, to include the foregoing direction in her will, which today is on file for probate here.

NEGRO PAYS PENALTY FOR ASSAULTING GIRL

RICHMOND, Va., July 11.—The final chapter in the most expeditious criminal prosecution in the history of the Old Dominion was enacted here today when Benjamin Bailey, colored, who criminally assaulted six-year-old Mary H. Follins, of Great Falls, paid the penalty in the electric chair. Bailey was arrested on May 29 and indicted at a special session of the grand jury. Less than two hours after he appeared in court on the following day, a jury had been drawn, the cases of both the state and the defense presented, the verdict of guilty had been returned and he was sentenced to death in the chair.

SLEEPS SIX DAYS AFTER A COCKTAIL

PORT TOWNSEND, Wash., July 11.—Sergeant Grogg, of the signal service corps is in a critical condition in the military hospital at Fort Worden, following his awakening after a six day's sleep. Grogg went to a dance on July 4, drank a cocktail and ate a dish of ice cream. Later in the evening he became drowsy and fell into a stupor from which he could not be aroused. Surgeons are watching the case closely in an attempt to solve the mystery.

HOUSE LOBBY PROBE BEGINS ON MONDAY

WASHINGTON, July 11.—The taking of testimony by the house lobby investigating committee is expected to start Monday, with former Speaker Cannon and former Representative Watson, of Indiana as the first witnesses. The committee will be unable to obtain Martin Mulhall's testimony.

RITCHIE GRINS OVER EXCUSES BY RIVERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 11.—Champion Willie Ritchie grinned today when told that Joe Rivers, in explaining his defeat to his friends, claimed that something went wrong with him during the fight. "If anything went wrong with Rivers," said Ritchie, "it was due solely to my right fist. As for his claim that he can beat me, nothing would suit me better than to fight him every day in the week, and I would not ask for \$18,000, either."

LOVER ACCUSED OF GIRLS MURDER

WILKESBARRE, Pa., July 11.—Promising new and sensational developments, the district attorney declared illegal today the verdict of the coroner's jury finding that Alice Crispell a sixteen-year-old girl, whose body was found floating in Harvey's lake, July 5, was murdered, but failing to fix responsibility for the crime. The prosecutor says he has sufficient evidence on which to hold Herbert Johns, 28 years of age, who was arrested a few days, when it was learned that the girl was last seen alive in his company.

ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 11.—Seattle won two prizes at the Elks' national convention in session here. Prizes were awarded today, including the following: For the most attractive floats, \$500, won by Seattle; best team in the competitive drills, Denver, \$500; greatest aggregate mileage, Seattle \$250.

WOMAN SUES FOR \$1990 PRICE OF KISS

EVERETT, Wa., July 11.—Mrs. Charles Nelson of Tolt, a mountain station east of here, filed suit against the Great Northern railway and George Thorne, an engineer, for \$1,990 damages, in which she charges the latter with forcibly kissing her while she was occupying a coach in a waiting train.

BREAKS NECK IN MOTORCYCLE RACE

MACON, Ga., July 11.—"I'll win this race or break my neck." The latter part of this declaration is fulfilled here today in the death of Martin O'Brien, who was instantly killed when his motorcycle skidded on a slippery track and dashed against a wall. A few minutes before the fatal accident O'Brien was thrown from his machine at the same spot in the course, but escaped injury. He at once demanded another machine and re-entered the race. In the second fall, his neck was broken and his skull fractured.

PELKEY TOO MUCH FOR SPARRING PARTNER

PORTLAND, Ore., July 11.—Tommy Burns, former heavyweight champion, has called a halt on being a human punching bag for Arthur Pelkey, the present champion and his protege, and has wired to Los Angeles for Al Norton, McCarty's former sparring mate. "I am so badly bruised as a result of boxing with Pelkey that I can hardly touch myself," mourned Burns today. "Pelkey has a terrible wall-punch and I'm afraid my chief concern on this theatrical tour will be to keep him supplied with boxing partners." Pelkey and Burns are appearing at a local theatre.

Trying to Harmonize all Sects

The Protestant Episcopal church in October, 1910, appointed a commission to bring about a conference for the consideration of questions as to the faith and order of the Christian church, in the hope that such a conference will promote the cause of Christian unity. That commission is inviting all Christian communions throughout the world which confess our Lord Jesus Christ as God and Savior to unite with the Episcopal church in arranging for and conducting such a conference. More than twenty such cooperating commissions have been appointed, including all the leading communions in the United States and the Church of England in England and Canada.

The Split Log Drag in Kentucky

MARION, Ky., July 11.—Circuit Judge J. F. Gordon, of Madisonville, talked entertainingly of the King split-log drag to a crowd that filled the court house. He told of what had been done in Hopkins county. He said Mr. King visited that county about a year ago and gave a demonstration of the split-log drag. The people then took hold where he left off and there are more than 300 miles of roads that are smooth as floors and which remain in good condition in bad weather.

How to Keep Boys and Girls in School

EUGENE, Ore., July 11.—"How to keep the boys and girls in school," might have been the subject of the lectures that are being given this week at the University of Oregon summer school by Charles S. Meek, the superintendent, whose revolutionizing of the school system of Boise, Idaho, has attracted national attention. "In four years," said Superintendent Meek in his lecture today, "in which the total school attendance at Boise has increased 25 per cent, we have increased the total high school attendance 151 per cent, and have increased the proportion who stick to it and graduate by 230 per cent."

WIDOW'S SALARY NO BAR TO PENSION

SALEM, Ore., July 11.—In an opinion rendered today, Attorney General Crawford held that it does not matter what the amount of a widow's salary or wages is, if she has children dependent upon her for support and has no other income aside from her wages, she is eligible to the benefits of the widows' pension law.
