Consul General August Kral of Austro-Hungary, verified the charge. He has just returned from Dolran, saying that many of the victims were either crucified, mutilated or buried alive.

(Continued from Page 1) Bryan that Ambassador Wilson had been summoned to Washington. Bryan refused to affirm or deny the report that Germany had formally requested the United States to intervene in Mexico.

Huerta Near Downfall

Senora Madero, widow of the martyred president of Mexico, Francisco I. Madero, believes the Huerta government is nearing its end. In arriving here, she said: "I do not believe the government of the traitors can long survive. I have not been following the political situation in Mexico since I left there. I have been living quietly in the United States since my husband's execution. When I arrived in New York I said my husband was murdered in cold blood, and I stand by that claim now."

Senator Fall of New Mexico is apprehensive of a military outbreak in Mexico City against the American residents. "Huerta evidently has concluded that if he is overthrown," said Fall this afternoon, "it might as well be by the Americans as the Mexicans. He has never controlled more than two states in Mexico, except insofar as he has held garrisons in cities. The situation of American citizens in Mexico now I consider to be most critical."

His aged mother offered to mortgage her home to defend the lad, but this he spurned.

CALIFORNIA I. W. W. OFFERS BROTHERS AID

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 16.—Secretary Klement of the San Francisco local of the I. W. W., stated today that 100 members of the local organization stand ready to go to Portland, if their services are needed there, but that free speech will not be made the main issue in the fight.

"The Portland fight has assumed a three-cornered aspect," said Klement "The socialists, socialist-labor party and a number of industrial workers are giving moral support to the Portland strikers and this is the basis that should be maintained."

"If it were solely a free speech fight of the I. W. W., it would be a different matter. We intend to stand alone in the future. The San Diego affair taught us not to combine with other organizations in a free speech fight."

FRIEDMANN'S PATIENT DIES LEAVING ORPHANS

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 16.—A pitiful story of blighted hope and disappointment in the quest for health came to light here today when it was learned that four orphan children and several other relatives of Alec Williamson of Los Angeles, Cal., who traveled 4000 miles to receive the Friedman tuberculosis cure are anxious to return home, their mission a failure. Williamson died last Friday.

Some of the children are already afflicted with tuberculosis, and it is doubtful if they are able to stand the long homeward journey.

The mother of the children died last April. It was then that the trip to Providence was decided upon in the hope of saving the little ones from the great white plague.
