

Many efforts have been made in the past to bulld this road and to connect the interior with the sea coast, but for some reason, whether from the influences of the Southern Pacific company or other potent influences, the project lafted to materialize. Now, however, there has been brought together a number of capitalists who have organized a construction company, capitalized at two and one-half millions of dollars, who announce that they are ready to commence construction of the railroad, and that they are not to be influenced or deterred in any way from carrying the project through to com-

The president of this construction is William Loftus, a millionaire oil operator; George C. Beckman, millionaire mine operator, is vice-president, and John Shepard, millionaire merchant, known all over the eastern states, is the treasurer. Offices for the company have been rented in the Conklin building, the north suite on the ground floor, and work of construction will commence at once. This first work will be upon the ten-mile unit from Grants Pass to Wilderville, which will be under the direction of Engineer Harmon for the city and represents the municipally owned portion of the line. The balance of the road will be constructed in the near future.
