USE BATTLESHIPS FOR HOSPITALS

ROME, July 22.—By an order formally announced today by the Minister of Marine, Italy solves the problem of what to do with discarded battleships, and also possibly, what to do with the entire navy, should world-wide disarmament ever come. As fast as the warships become too antiquated for modern naval use, they will hereafter be given to the National Society for the Care of Tubercular Children of Italy and its colonies. The society plans to refit the war vessels into hospitals and give them permanent anchorage not only about the coast of Italy, but off the coast in whatever part of the world Italian colonies are to be found. Others will be used as cruising hospitals for those of the invalids who need such treatment. The action today of the Italian government in giving its consent is the result of a propaganda to that end begun at the International Congress of Hygiene held at Rome last year.

NEW BUNCO GRAFT RING BEING PROBED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 22.—Alleged police protection of a second bunco ring, reported to exceed in viciousness the \$300,000 Italian gang recently exposed, is to be made the subject of a searching investigation, it was announced here today, by the grand jury, the police commission and District Attorney Chas. M. Fickert. Fickert and his aides started working on the case yesterday, and subpoenas will be served today on ex-Chief of Police Martin and Millard Dunbury, an alleged member of several gambling clubs. Fickert openly charges that the Waldorf club is the hangout for a gang of bunco men, just as the saloon at 544 Broadway here was the rendezvous of Mike Gallo, Frank Dubois and Maurice De Martin and their associates. Dunbury, District Attorney Fickert says, has admitted that the gambling clubs pay a fixed amount each month to the police for protection.

KNOCKS ARANT DOWN AND OUT WITH WRENCH

KLAMATH FALLS, July 22.—The latest development in the Arant-Steel Crater Lake embroglio was a personal encounter between Mr. Arant and Mr. Parkhurst of the Crater Lake Development company at Fort Klamath this afternoon which ended when the latter struck the former superintendent of the national park over the head with a wrench inflicting a serious scalp wound and for which he will have to answer in the next session of the federal court. According to the report brought here tonight the two men got into an argument over the ejection of Arant from the national park by U. S. Marshal Leslie Scott and when Arant warmly upbraided both Scott and Steele Parkhurst enraged sprang upon him. In the midst of the conflict Parkhurst seized an auto wrench and struck his opponent down. Parkhurst claims the blow was struck in self-defense while Arant declares it was assault with attempt to kill. Spectators of the affray took Parkhurst away and a warrant for his arrest will probably be issued tomorrow.
