

### FRED ANDERSON BRINGS BRIDE TO NORTHERN HOME

(Portland Journal.)  
That Bud Anderson will be even better as a boxer when he crawls into the ring again about Thanksgiving day, is the information brought to Portland by Freddie Anderson, his brother and chief sparring partner, who arrived yesterday. Fred says that Bud was due today to leave the hospital at Santa Monica, where he underwent an operation for appendicitis right after his defeat at the hands of Leach Cross on July 4. Freddie says that Uncle Tom McCarry is now figuring on matching Bud and Joe Rivers for his turkey day date, figuring that the two with their big following in Los Angeles ought to make him a more profitable house than even a championship fight.

"Dr. Thomas, who removed Bud's appendix," said Freddie, "expressed surprise that Bud should have been able to crawl into the ring with Cross, in the condition he was in. The doctor said the condition of the appendix showed Bud had suffered four distinct attacks in about six months without knowing it. He had a slight attack while we were in vaudeville here, but we thought it stomach disorder. The appendix, which was removed through an opening three-quarters of an inch in length, was about five inches long and the concretion about three times the size of an olive seed and as hard as a stone. It was said to have been the most successful operation performed at Santa Monica. Dr. Thomas spread the muscles instead of cutting them, and then sewed them back over the incision, giving a double layer of muscle covering. The doctor says Bud ought to fight better than at any time in his life and be far stronger than before. The Ad Wolgast incision was four inches long.

#### Can Beat Dentist

"Bud can beat Cross. Cross is a shade better fighter than Mandot. He has a good right hand, but he can't stand body punishment. He is a clever fellow and can hit hard, but hot as hard as Bud. Bud figures that he got hit over the appendix in the first round of the fight, and it inflamed the member and further sapped his strength. He kicked Cross all over the ring in the sixth round and had a shade in the seventh, but after that we knew Bud would be lucky if he stayed the limit.

"His defeat has not impaired his standing one whit in Los Angeles, and he and Rivers would doubtless draw a record-breaking house."

"That talk of Bud having to go into a Turkish bath on the morning of the Cross fight is all bosh. He never even thought of one, much less going into it. He was trained right down to the notch and when he and Leach got on the scales both of them shivered the beam a moment and it dropped back, showing that they were exactly the same weight.

#### North in Two Weeks

"Bud will come north in about two weeks with Dick Donald and will spend several months on his ranch three miles from Vancouver. He is to be initiated into the Elks' lodge at Medford in a couple of weeks. The Medford fans sent a big bouquet to him while he was in the hospital at Santa Monica, and I never saw so many flowers as came from his various admirers. Bud bought an automobile for our mother so that she can visit him daily at the ranch.

"And here is where I come in for a little space. I got married July 5 at Los Angeles to Miss Louise Green of Palms, Cal., near Los Angeles. Her father has been in the mercantile business, but together we are going into the garage business at San Diego and I shall make my home there in about six weeks. I don't know whether I shall be able to help Bud get into condition for his fights in the future or not. It all depends on how the garage business gets along."

### CANNOT TAX LAND RECLAMATION SCHEMES

BOISE, Idaho, July 23.—In a ruling today made by Federal Judge Frank S. Dietrich, land within government reclamation projects cannot be taxed while the United States holds title. ### JOHN MASON AT PAGE TONIGHT IN UP-TO-DATE PLAY

"As a Man Thinks" is in four acts, these depicting scenes associated with New York's smartest social set, but all centered about the love life of two young sweethearts, sweetly influenced by the mysterious sympathetic power of an old family physician, Dr. Seelig (Mr. Mason). Julie Herne, the beautiful daughter of the famous actor-author, James A. Herne, who wrote "Hearts of Oak" and "Shore Acres," is in Mr. Mason's company, and other popular players of the support cast include John Flood and George Gaston.

### COPPER MINERS IN MICHIGAN OUT

MARQUETTE, Mich., July 23.—More than 15,000 miners in the Michigan copper country are idle today, and all the copper mines in the district are closed because the Western Federation of Miners is about to order a strike.

The mines have been closed against all the workers of the district, although only about 20 per cent of them are affiliated with the federation. Recently the federation men demanded recognition of the union, an eight-hour day and improved working conditions. Their demands were denied.

The operators declared today that they are prepared for an indefinite shutdown. So far there have been few disorders.

### PHONE COMPANY TOLD TO INCREASE RATES ON PHONES

SALEM, Ore., July 23.—Establishing a precedent that may have far reaching effect, the state railroad commission today issued an order directing the Eastern Oregon co-operative telephone company in Union county to increase its rates more than double as a matter of self-preservation for itself and fair dealing toward its competitor which alleges it cannot continue to exist in competition with former rates.

In this case the Home Independent Telephone company complained that the Eastern Oregon company was ruining its business by its low competitive rates and that it was securing the cream of the business in Union county, and that it was operating its lines, which served Elgin, Summerville, Cove and Union at a loss to itself.


